Forty Years With One Firm.

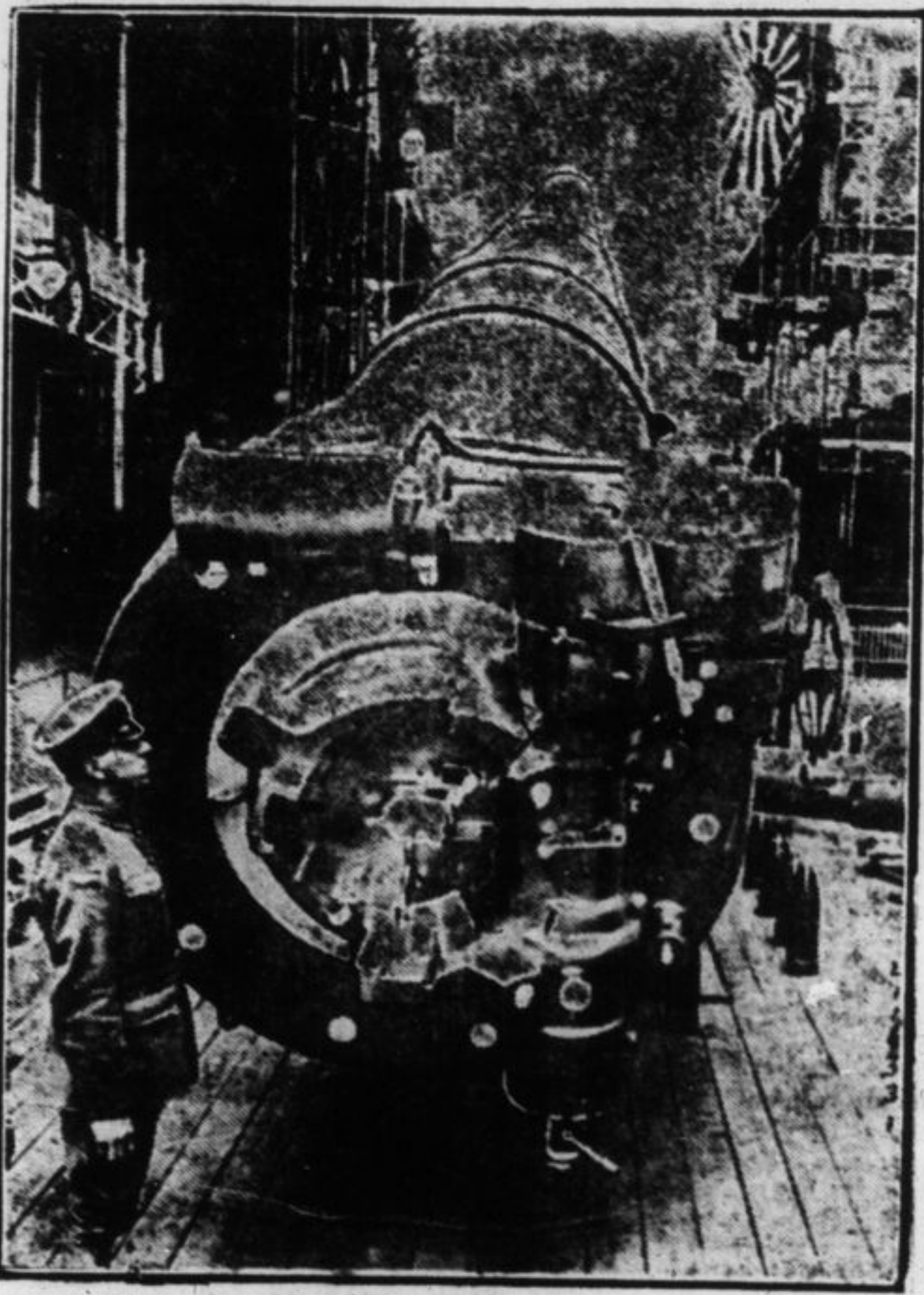
which was introduced during the four years of the war. The request of the chiefs was under strong criticism from the Allied Trades and Labor Council at Ottawa at their last meeting.

Mrs. MacDonald retained a cheery, loving disposition, which made for her many friends and a strong and enduring faith which sustained her to the end. In 1857 she was united in marriage to Lauchlin MacDonald, who died in 1918, and took up pioneer life, clearing their home on the farm now owned by James Banker, Biakoney.
