

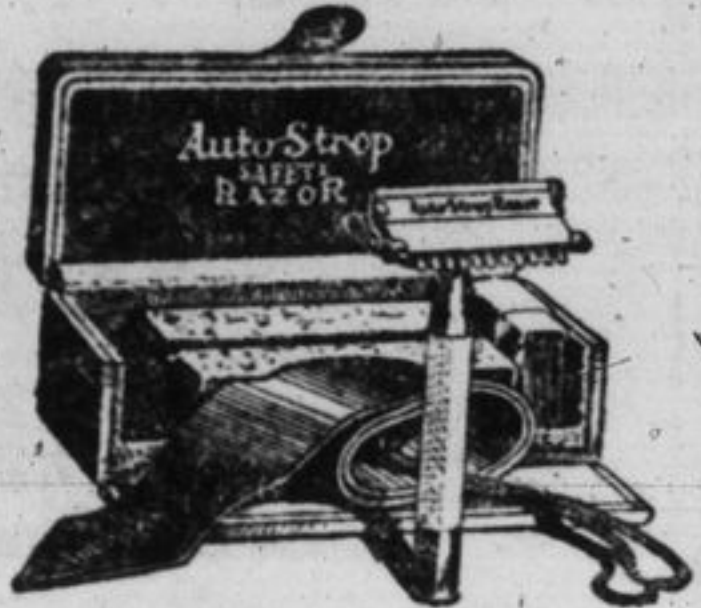

GOLF PROFESSIONALS REBEL AGAINST FEES.

The New York Times Says: Detroit golf professionals have mutinied against the plans of the directors of the Michigan state open championship and will not sign the event unless a change in the conditions is made. The requirements are for each entrant to pay a fee of \$25 in order that a group of five prizes may be awarded. The pros say that this means playing for their own money, whereas as they insist that the state association should follow the plan used in other sections and offer purses to the pros for competing. Several of the pros who have delivered the ultimatum are former easterners.

HUN RACE TRACKS ARE NOW CROWDED

Democracy has really reached Germany. The racetracks show that, if all other signs are missing.

The hundreds of thousands who now attend the race meets in Hamburg, Hulleben, Grunewald, Frankfurt and Dresden are "of the people." The pomp and display that marked racing back in the Kaiser's days are gone. The big crowds who now attend are working folks, and they are taking this amusement with all the gusto and enthusiasm that their former masters had.

The "Kaiser's box" at one of the suburban tracks is still barred off, just as the middle roadway through the Brandenburg gate is scarcely used—from force of habit which reserved the place to royalty.

But the loges and all the fine pieces are taken now by proletarians, for, with increased wages and with no appreciable increase in the price of tickets, the working man can enjoy his afternoon's outings without nicking his pocketbook particularly.

The most amazing feature of the racing game, however, is the way in which the public spends its money on race gambling. The "totalisator" method is used, and hundreds of thousands of marks flow after other hundreds of thousands into the machines.

Equals Stallion Record.

When the Calgary owned pacer, Calgary Earl, passed a mile in 2.02 1/4 at Toledo, O., Tuesday, he equalled the record for pacing stallions foaled in Canada, which was made several years ago by Hal B. Jr., 2.02 1/4.

The record for pacing mares foaled in Canada, made by Darhey Hal, is also 2.02 1/4, while the record for pacers foaled in Canada, any age or sex, is 1.59 1/4, made by the Quebec-bred gelding Frank Bogash Jr. The latter is also the world's champion pacing gelding.
