After nearly two hours of argument by W. H. Trueman, K.C., Winnipeg, for the petitioners, which developed into a running conversation between counsel and their lordships, the lord chancellor dismissed the petition without calling on Sir John Simon, the respondents' lawyer.

The lord chancellor said : "The petitioner asks leave to appeal in a criminal matter. He asks the privy council to advise his majesty that there should be an exercise of his prerogative. Such advice is only given in a very special class of case. It is sufficient for me to say that the petitioner has entirely failed in our opinion to bring the matter within that class of petition."

Soft Coal Coming in Fairly Well; Hard Not So Freely.

NEED PROVINCIAL SURVEY


To Find Out the Names of Places Which Require Coal Most.

Yoronto, July 21 .- "What should be done to handle this fuel question is to have rules and regulations issued by which an enforced survey of every province should be made by the men handling each district, so as to out those places which need coal, and to know just precisely those survey," So says Fuel Controller Har- ty of all Greenland.
