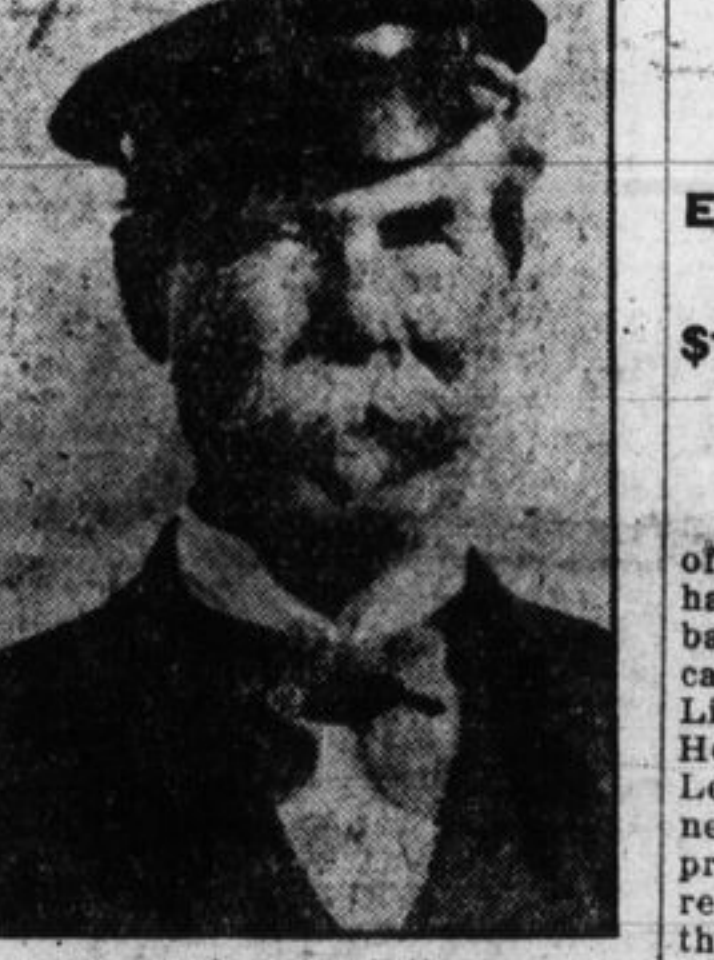
TURKEY TO SIGN THE PEACE TREATY

THIRD RACE FOR CUP IN PROGRESS

It Started At One O'clock—The Wind Very Light—Shamrock Again Leads At the Start.

MUST NOT ADVANCE FURTHER IN POLAND

London, July 21.—The British government's reply to the note of Foreign Minister Tchitcherin, of Soviet Russia, regarding an armistice with Poland was despatched last night. It intimates that if the Russians advance further into Poland all negotiations for trade between Great Britain and Russia will be broken off.

WILL ATTEMPT TO REACH NORTH POINT

Which is a Wish of the Danish Exploration of North Greenland

Copenhagen, July 21.—An attempt to reach North Point and thus complete the Danish exploration of North Greenland, will be made by Knud Koch, the young Danish scientist and Polar explorer, this summer. The aim of his expedition, which is expected to last about two years, aside from scientific purposes, is to secure Danish sovereignty over all Greenland.

IRON SHUTTERS HAVE CAUSED MANY RIOTS

Calgary, July 21.—Three hundred million bushels is the estimate at present placed on the western crop of the three western provinces by J. M. Cameron, general superintendent of the Alberta division of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

SETTLEMENT OF IRISH QUESTION

Sinn Fein And British Government Are Said to Be Discussing the Matter—Statement Expected Thursday.

SHAMROCK THE WINNER OF A THRILLING RACE

Defeats Resolute By 2 Minutes And 26 Seconds But Finished Nine And a Half Minutes Ahead of the American Yacht.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Sandy Hook, N.J., July 21.—The thrills were all saved for the last twelve miles of the thirty-mile triangular sail for the America's Cup yesterday. Both yachts had lashed along in a vagrant breeze, Shamrock steadily drawing away from her glistening white pursuer until the challenge came within about two miles of the second mark.

Start. Shamrock 12.15.48 Resolute 12.16.26

First Turn. Shamrock 2.28.28 Resolute 2.32.41 Shamrock's lead at first turn, 3 minutes, 35 seconds.

Second Turn. Shamrock 4.26.29 Resolute 4.35.20 Shamrock's lead at second turn 8 minutes and 53 seconds.

Finish. Shamrock 5.37.58 Resolute 5.47.25 Shamrock's lead at finish 9 minutes and 26 seconds.

With no breeze from any quarter at eight o'clock this morning there was little prospect for a race between the cup challenger and the defender. To-day.

READY FOR DEFEAT

New York, July 21.—Sir Thomas Lipton will have no rest if he succeeds in lifting the America Cup. William Gardner, who designed the Vanitie, has been commissioned to start work immediately on an American challenger if the Resolute is the loser in the present series of races. He has declined to give out any of the details of his plans or the name of the man backing him.

HARDING HITS AT LEAGUE OF NATIONS

PRINCE OF WALES SENDS STOCK TO ALBERTA RANCH

London, July 21.—H.R.H. the Prince of Wales shipped eight horses and eleven ponies by Dominion Express to his ranch in Alberta by the steamer "Montcalm" from Bristol on the 7th July. They will be transferred from the boat at Montreal to a Dominion Express horse car for their 2,250 mile journey to their future home in the foothills of the Rockies.

MARMORA WOMAN'S BODY FOUND IN CROWE RIVER
