Paris, July 21.—Lieut.-Col. Peers Davidson, K.C., son of the Hon. Sir Charles Peers Davidson, former Chief Justice of the Superior Court in Montreal, died here suddenly of heart failure Monday night.

BRING CASE AGAINST WIDOW

OF THE LATE GEORGE HALL, OGDENSBURG, N.Y.

Executors Want Title to Property Determined—Mrs. Hall Claims One-Half In Addition to \$200,000 Trust Bequests.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., July 21.—The differences between the executors of the will of the late George Hall, Ogdensburg, and his widow, Matilda L. Hall, living in Montreal, are scheduled to be heard in supreme court at the fall term in Canton, and the case promises to evoke a large degree of interest owing to the prominence of the parties.

The last will and testament of Mr. Hall was probated in St. Lawrence county shortly after his death and left a large sum of money for the establishment of an industrial school here, and also for the care and maintenance of the Helen Hall memorial academy, which he gave to the city.

The action which has now been brought by the executors of the estate of the late Mr. Hall against his widow is for the purpose of determining the title to pieces of property left by Mr. Hall and to obtain a construction of the will left by him.

Practically the same issues were tried in an action brought by Mrs. Hall against her husband in Montreal some years ago. At that time she claimed one-half of the property and asked that the same be set off to her on the ground that Mr. Hall was incompetent to manage his affairs.

SEEKING NEW TRADE PACT WITH FRANCE

Negotiations Now Under Way Between the Two Governments.

Ottawa, July 21.—Negotiations have been initiated looking to the conclusion of a new trade agreement between Canada and France. Some time ago the French treaty was abrogated, the government of France, desiring to wipe off all such trade conventions and to start anew with a clean slate.

Communications are now passing between the Canadian and French governments looking to a new arrangement which it is hoped to conclude in the course of a few months, and is expected to embrace an extensive list of commodities.

Say 200,000 Flee from Bolsheviks.

Warsaw, July 21.—Thousands of refugees fleeing before the Bolsheviks are assembling at the railroad junctions in towns west of the fighting front.

It is estimated that more than 200,000 refugees have arrived in the region of Brest-Litovsk in the last few days.
