MILLIONS FOR PLAYHOUSES

They Are In Great Demand In New York.

New York, July 24.—Millions are being spent for new playhouses to insure New Yorkers ample amusement this winter, although flat builders cannot get loans for housing the masses of the metropolis district.

This was revealed today when a survey was made of the rush of theater constructions, which disclosed that \$25,000,000 worth of new amusement houses were underway.

Many of the new playhouses are wiping out old flats and dwellings urgently needed for homes, social welfare investigators declare, and as a result the housing shortage is becoming more acute.

The theatre builders assert that the immense sums pouring into places of amusement are justified as the new construction guarantees them a profitable return on the investment.

Although there are 600 running theaters in the greater city and 650 in the entire metropolitan district, eight new theatres costing more than \$12,000,000 are planned in Long
