MILLIONS FOR PLAYHOUSES

They Are in Great Demand in New  
York.

New York, July 24.—Millions are  
being spent for new playhouses to  
insure New Yorkers ample amuse-  
ment this winter, although flat build-  
ers cannot get loans for housing the  
masses of the metropolitan district.

This was revealed today when a  
survey was made of the rush of the-  
atre constructions, which disclosed  
that \$25,000,000 worth of new amu-  
sement houses were under way.

Many of the new playhouses are  
wiping out old flats and dwellings  
urgently needed for homes, social  
welfare investigators declare, and as  
a result the housing shortage is be-
