

BIG MONEY IN BOOTLEGGING

IT IS DIFFICULT TO STAMP OUT THE TRAFFIC

It is up to the United States Authorities to check the Smuggling of Liquor From Canada.

Ottawa, July 24.—As long as profits from bootlegging are what they are, and the only deterrent is a fine of \$200 or so there will be big money in the bootlegging game and it will be very difficult for the authorities on either side of the international line to stamp out the traffic.

That is the summary of opinions expressed by Ottawa officials as to the situation regarding smuggling of liquor from Canada to the United States.

The situation apparently is that from three provinces in particular there is a large trade in bootlegged liquor to the United States.

At Windsor and in the surrounding districts the Mounted Police are carrying on a constant campaign against the illegal liquor vendors.

Quebec, it is stated, is the mecca for thirty thousands of Americans every week-end and carry their loads of human and other freight bound for the Sahara across the border.

The chief reason for the difficulty of enforcement according to an official of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, who have under their jurisdiction the carrying out of all federal laws, is the fact that many people are not in sympathy with the liquor legislation.
