



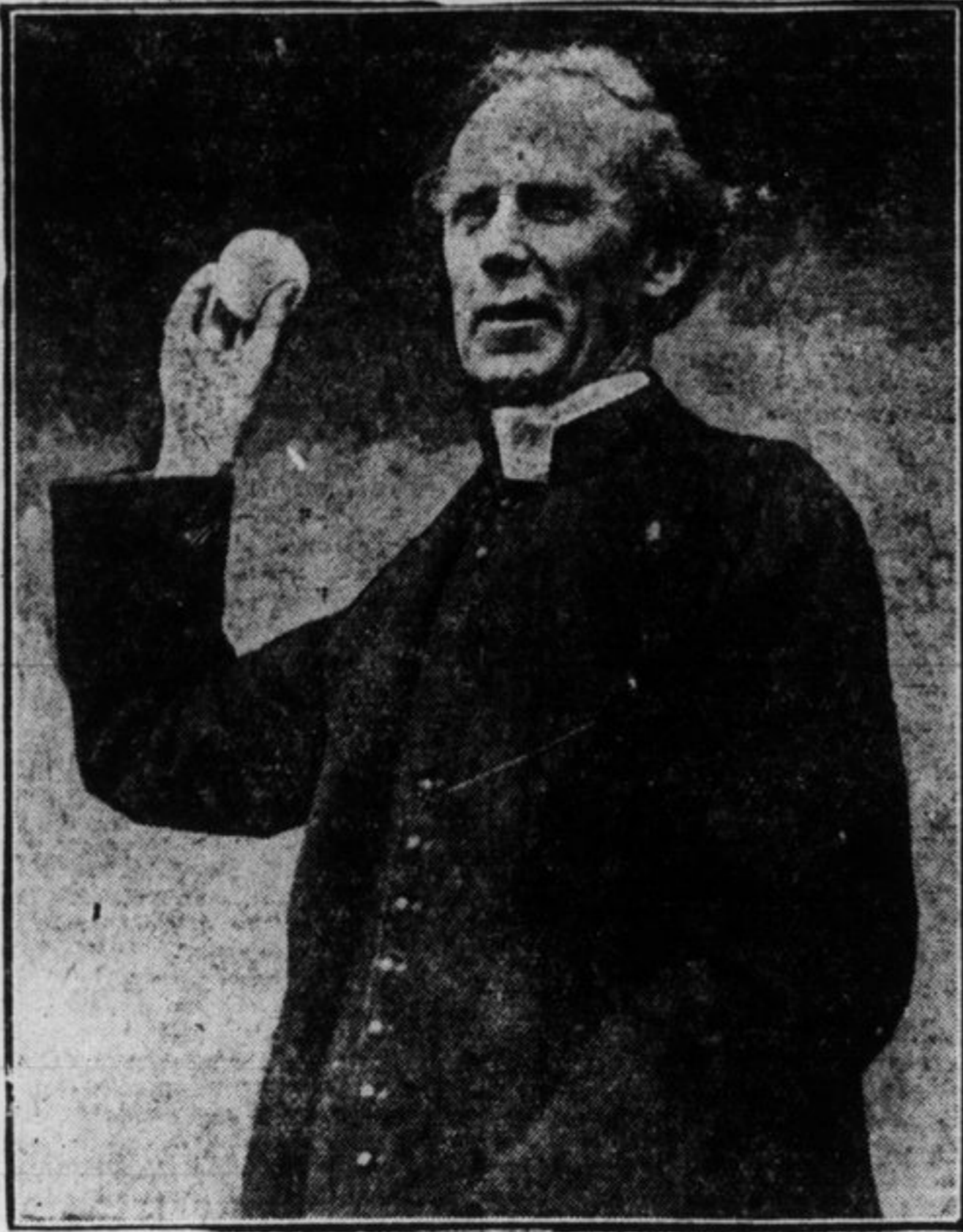

PROPOSED RAILWAY CHANGE

IS BEING WATCHED WITH INTEREST IN BACK COUNTRY.

Report States Changes Are to be Made on Trains Running Between Kingston, Bannockburn and Picton—Some Dissatisfaction in Certain Sections.

People living in the back part of the county, who for years have been served by the Bay of Quinte Railroad, and latterly the Canadian Northern Railroad, are anxiously waiting to see whether the reported change in the service will go into effect.

On Tuesday, when a Whig representative was in the vicinity of York and Camden East he heard many reports about the change in the service, which it is claimed will go into effect the first of August. It is stated that the railroad company proposes to make a change in the trains which run to and from Kingston, and to Bannockburn, and the one which runs from Kingston to Picton. A rumor is to the effect that the company intends to do away with running its trains over the Canadian Pacific railway from Kingston and Harrowsmith and will after that date switch the trains at the Kingston outer station, and take them by the main line of the Grand Trunk railroad company, as far as Napanee, and then switch them upon the main line of the Canadian Northern Railroad, which runs from Toronto to Ottawa. If such a change is made, it will mean that some people will be better served while others will be put to the inconvenience of travelling a longer distance to get to their homes. At the present time, the C. N. R. has running rights over the C. P. R. track from Harrowsmith to Kingston.

A representative of the railroad company when interviewed by the Whig, stated that for some time there had been rumors of such a change, but he was not in a position to state whether or not it was true.

People living in the back parts, are far from being satisfied with the service, since the Grand Trunk and the C.N.R. were united. They claim that the express end of the business is being neglected by the company, in an endeavor to make speed with the passenger trains.

All along the line of the C.N.R., men are busy making repairs to the track. It is stated that since the heavier trains have been run over them it has been found necessary to strengthen the road.

Paris, July 26.—The world's greatest prize for music, the Prix de Rome, has been won by Mile. Canal, aged thirty, who thus fittingly crowns a brilliant musical career. All her life has been spent in the study of music. Her cantata, "Don Juan," evoked great enthusiasm last year. Among the judges at the Academy of Fine Arts was the veteran composer, Saint Saens.

Mile. Canal was so overcome with emotion on hearing of the decision of the judges that she fainted. Only two other women have won the Prix de Rome before, one for sculpture and the other for music.
