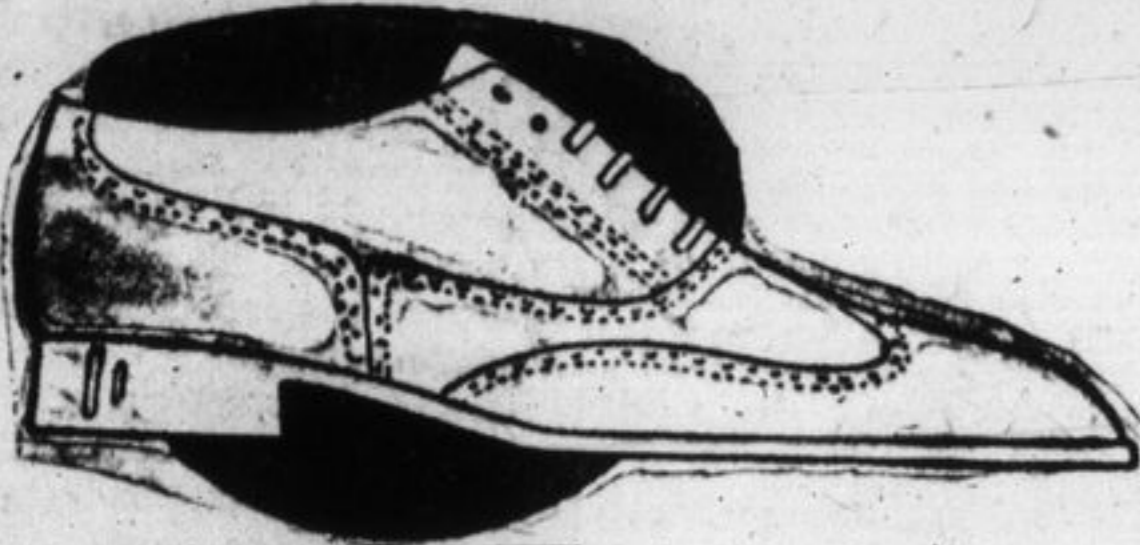

## LOOKING FOR INCREASES

LOCAL RAILROAD WORKERS WANT AWARD EFFECTIVE.

Stuart Watts, of Kingston Union, Will Confer With Toronto Officials — Why Interest Is Manifested.

Considerable interest is being manifested in local railroad circles concerning the prospective wage increases to be granted to Canadian railroad workers. When the railroad workers of the United States were unified under the central control of the United States railway administration wage increases were awarded from time to time by an adjustment board under the chairmanship of William Gibbs McAdoo, first director-general of the administration. These awards were also used as the basis of wage adjustments on Canadian roads and the present interest arises from the recent award of over \$600,000,000 granted to American railroad workers. The members of the Canadian railroad unions are now agitating for increases similar to those granted their Yankee brethren, and it is believed that the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Grand Trunk lines will follow the lead announced on Wednesday of the Canadian National Railways which is accepting the American adjustment as the basis of award.

It is believed that the Canadian railway heads feel that any increase should be contingent upon the substantial raising of freight and passenger rates in order that the additional labor costs should be borne by the users of the roads. Already an application is before the Dominion railway commission to secure higher rates and an advertising campaign, emphasizing the needs of the railroads in view of increased expenses is being carried on at the present time.

Local employees of the railroads are desirous of securing the advanced scale and it is probable that Stuart Watts, a member of one of the local unions of railroad workers, will go to Toronto on Saturday night to confer with railroad heads and make representations on behalf of the local workers.
