

Thirty-three students of Masson Hall, one of the numerous hostels in which women students reside, have gone on record as refusing to obey instructions regarding the use of night keys. The girls assert that they are being treated as children, rather than as young women well able to take care of themselves.

The protest resulted in a petition to the university requesting a change in the warden of the half. The view of the management is that too much liberty was given the girls under the previous regime, and that unless they alter their petition, the girls must leave the hall at the end of the ses-

When women won their right to compete with men in the professions, they practically won all the rights that appertain to the acquirement and practice of thise professions. 
EVER SEE A HOG DRUNK. Intoxicated Animals Gave Clue to
