**Pulpwood Being Cut.**

started at the Hydro plant on the old  
Rathbun property, North Hastings.  
Five carloads of pulp are cut and  
loaded during the night shift and  
four on the day shift. One hundred  
and twenty-six cords of pulpwood  
are cut and loaded in the course of  
every twenty-four hours.

laid in a few weeks. Three new  
trucks, valued at \$9,000 each, are  
being used by the Dufferin Construc-  
tion Company to haul away the rock.

**Gasoline May Go Up.**  
Some garage dealers in private

cents a gallon in Kingston, and pre-  
dictions were recently made that it  
would go much higher. There is  
also some talk that a system of ra-  
tioning and gasless Sundays may  
have to be instituted again to curb  
waste of the precious oil. Whole-  
sale dealers are advocating rigid  
conservation of the material.
