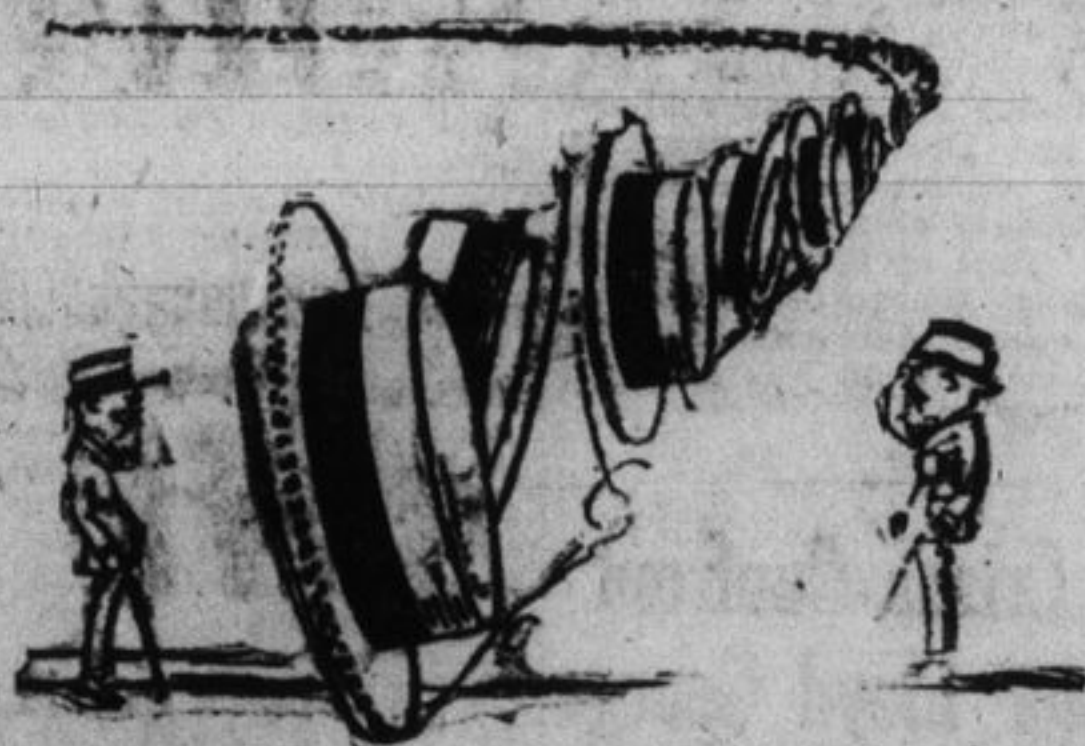

DESERTS BABY IN STATION

KINGSTON WOMAN PLACED UNDER ARREST AT BROCKVILLE.

Infant Was Hidden Behind a Stove, With a Feeding Bottle and a Can of Condensed Milk—Woman May be Deranged.

The Brockville Recorder-Times, of Thursday, has the following:

"Confessing to having deserted her six-weeks old baby in the washroom of the union station last evening, Miss Fannie Hayes, aged thirty-one, of Kingston, was arrested by Chief of Police Burke. The woman was attempting to hide behind a door of the residence of Charles Beach, 419 King street west, where she had spent the night, after leaving the station.

Charged by Chief of Police Burke with having deserted the child, the woman gave way and confessed. She was slightly acquainted with Mrs. Beach, who gave her lodging last night on her statement that she was out of funds and needed a place to sleep prior to leaving for Butternut Bay this morning. She added that she intended to proceed from Butternut Bay to Grenadier Island, where she believed no person would look for her.

The baby was born here six weeks ago. Miss Hayes went to Kingston with the child and there endeavored to secure foster-parents for the infant. Failing in this effort, she returned to Brockville.

The Hayes woman was lodged in the cells at the police station. She gives the name of a certain Brown, whose Christian name is unknown to her, as the man in the case.

"The baby was found on the floor of the women's toilet room at the Union station, with two well-filled nursing bottles and a can of condensed milk.

"Police officials are inclined to think that either the woman deliberately abandoned the child or else became temporarily deranged. The variance with which she indicated her destination would appear to have some weight in supporting the latter theory."

The Kingston police, on being informed of the matter, could not identify the Hayes woman.

THE PRICE OF COAL TO BE RAISED HERE

Freight Rate Increases in the United States Will Boost the Prices.

Coal is due for another jump in Kingston at the end of the month. The Interstate Commerce Commission of the United States recently gave the railways a substantial increase in freight rates and as in the case of other commodities, this will have to be paid by the consumer. Coal coming into Kingston is carried to the lake shore by American roads from Pennsylvania, and as a result the higher freight rates will mean higher costs to the consumer. It is not known definitely what the increase will be as the new rates do not go into effect until August 26th. At the present time coal is selling in Kingston for \$15.00 a ton, Montreal expects that the price there will be \$15.75 when the new rates go into effect.
