For years Kingstonians have had an opportunity, from time to time, of hearing this blind musician play the organ but this summer he has entertained them with his singing for the first time.

**The Case Settled.**  
Chris Thomas and Lyle Aubin, Toronto, before Police Magistrate Williams, Toronto, recently charged with the theft of motor car tires and rims from Chris Lowder, West Lake, were released on suspended sentence after making restitution to Lowder to the amount of \$106, paying costs of court and giving bonds for \$500 to appear for sentence if called on.

**Will Be Fine Gates.**  
Derl Head has been engaged to do the carpentering work on the Prince Edward Old Boys' Memorial, at Picton, and associated with him in the work will be his son, Glen Head and Albert Ostrander, both first class mechanics. Mr. Head himself is busy engaged in building the gates and when complete they will be as fine a piece of workmanship as it is possible to turn out in the carpentering line.

**Increases In Assessment.**  
Commissioner Edward Mooers has finished the work of assessing the city. The probabilities are that about \$2,000,000 additional will be added to the city's valuation of property, etc. It is some five years

since any advance in assessment has been made and an increase, everyone will admit has been about due. The increases range from ten to 20 per cent. It is expected that a lower rate of taxation will result next year possibly thirty to thirty-one mills on the dollar.

**Sang Verse Sweetly.**  
Mrs. Ross Bradley, after many years' absence, sang on Sunday morning in Sydenham street Methodist church, in her old form and with sweet voice and expression. She has lost none of her winsomeness and brightness. In recent years Mrs. Bradley has been living in China and India; her husband is a physician and graduate of Queen's University.

**Appointed Agent at Smith's Falls.**  
John W. Kitchen, until recently freight agent at Brockville for the Canadian Pacific railway, has been appointed to act in a similar capacity at Smith's Falls, in succession to G. O. Weeks, who is retiring because of ill health. Mr. Kitchen will assume his duties in the course of a few days. Mr. Kitchen's early railroading experience was secured as an operator on the Grand Trunk, from which road he transferred to the C.P.R. before the war he was agent for the C.P.R., at Bellamy.

**Sad Drowning Accident.**  
On Monday a sad drowning accident occurred at Picton when Florence Rosenberg, daughter of Mrs. Rosenberg, lost her life in Picton harbor. The young girl, in her thirteenth year, was accompanied by her sister, Malzie, and a young man named Arthur Mack. The three walked to the lower dock and in some way Florence fell in the water and was drowned before assistance could reach her. Her body was recovered about an hour later.

**Kingston Pen Contest.**  
At the egg-laying contest in Ottawa the leaders for the past week, Mr. Goldham's Barred Rock Pen No. 11, Kingston, have, by some excellent production compiled an enviable total of fifty-nine and in so doing they constitute a new record for a seven days' yield. The daily returns from this pen read thus, 8, 8, 7, 9, 10, 9 and 8. It would appear that these birds have taken example from their pen-companion No. 1, which is the leading bird in the contest to date. The leading individual to date has by six eggs this week taken her grand total to 206, so that she now possesses a twelve point advantage of the next best bird.

**Difficult to Place Blame.**  
On Saturday afternoon, Anthony Rankin, M.P.P., when asked by the Whig who was responsible for the condition of the Kingston-Seeley's Bay road, stated that it was almost impossible to lay the blame on any body in particular. He stated for the Ottawa Government had approved of the plans for the new highway, which extends from Kingston to Ottawa, which will go by way of Perth and Rideau Ferry, or in other words by way of Elgin and Seeley's Bay, and it is now up to the provincial government to take over the road. As soon as the provincial government takes over the road, it will mean that plans for the new highway will be put into action. Places on the road which at the present time are badly in need of repair will likely be attended to.

**GIVEN NAME BY FRANKLIN**  
Suggestion of Famous Philosopher Resulted in Current's Becoming Known as Gulf Stream.

The Gulf stream, which was discovered by Ponce de Leon while on his famous search for the fountain of youth, received its name through a suggestion of Benjamin Franklin, because it issued from the Gulf of Mexico. While it is only a part of the grand scheme of ocean circulation, and the Gulf of Mexico is in reality only a stopping place, this name is generally applied to the current now as it was given by Franklin.

Franklin's theory of the cause of ocean currents, the Detroit News remarks, was that the winds produce the current by air moving over the surface of the water, and thus illustrated his theory: "It is known that a large piece of water ten miles broad and generally only three feet deep, has by a strong wind had its water driven to one side and sustained so as to become six feet deep, while the windward side was laid dry."

Center of Population Moving.  
How many of us can tell off-hand the exact center of the population of the United States? Every ten years the government calculates with great accuracy just where this point lies. The center moves westward at the rate of about fifty miles every ten years. When the center was first calculated in 1790 it lay three miles east of Baltimore, Md. In the first ten years it moved forty miles westward. By 1860 it had reached the State of Ohio and is today crawling slowly across the State of Indiana. In 190 years, says Boys' Life, the point has traveled westward about 600 miles.
