Boston, Aug. 25 .- A list of investors in the Ponzi postal coupon scheme-persons who trusted in the ability of the over-night financier to make riches for them in a month or two-looked like a cross-section of the community when it was printed to-day. All walks of life were there-men and women of the professions, of business and of labor. It is estimated that thirty thousand in all placed their money in the scheme. which is now in receivership, and of these about one-half withdrew it with or without the 50 per cent. interest which Ponzi paid before the crash. The others are relying on Federal receivers to recover what is left. The list runs the gamut from judge to office boy. Whole families joined in trusting to Ponzi to bring them wealth, the word-of-mouth method by which his propaganda spread being traced in the lists through families, communities and business circles. CAN RESTORE LIFE AFTER HEART STOPS

Paris Surgeon Declares Stopped Heart Can be Re-animated.

Paris, Aug. 25.—Resurrection from the dead is no longer merely a Biblical legend, but an authenticated fact, acording to the celebrated French surgeon Tuffier, who asserts that a heart which has stopped beating can be reanimated.
