**NOT AT ALL EXAGGERATED INCIDENTS OF THE DAY**

**Says Rev. Mr. Dale Regarding Newspaper Accounts of Irish Affairs.**

"The newspaper accounts of the happenings in Ireland are not at all exaggerated," said Rev. W. Taylor Dale, pastor of Cooke's Presbyterian church, who has just returned from a visit to his former home at Omagh, Ireland. Rev. Mr. Dale described many of the things that he saw during his stay there, but the amazing thing that struck him was the conviction that a large part of the population was under, viz., that Ireland is a republic in London, where his brother keeps a drug store, there are barricades of men and arms at the street corners and soldiers in full service equipment, constantly on guard. During one stage of hostilities his brother had to send his family to a place of safety outside the city. In the large centres where fighting has occurred, animosities between the Sinn Fein, the republicans, and the anti-republicans, were shown by boycotting, but in the rest of the country the ordinary citizens live together quietly. The soldiers and police, however, are constantly on the move. Courts are carried on in the name of the republic and hold regular sittings; the mails are repeatedly raided and letters of citizens opened and forwarded to them with part of the writing deleted "by the republican censor." Those who formerly clamored for home rule are now out and out republicans, and the country has no great leaders of the type of the late John Redmond whose death was a great blow.

When asked whether there was any economic cause at the bottom of the trouble, Mr. Dale said such was not the case as the country was prosperous. It was political pure and simple. There was no poverty or adverse condition of trade to constitute a grievance against the British government, which desired the very best for the people and refrained from instituting repressive measures. In sections where rioting and reprisals have occurred, troops have been placed on duty to keep down disorders and protect life and property. The government is determined that there shall be no republic.

When asked what was to be the outcome of the condition now existing, Mr. Dale said the solution was only to be reached by the moderates of both parties getting together with the determination to arrive at an agreement. It was thought that some plan of dominion home rule would best settle the whole matter.

After spending two weeks at his old home in Ireland, Mr. Dale paid a visit to Scotland before returning to Canada.

**R. F. ELLIOTT HOPES FOR CHEAPER POWER**

**Hopes to See Kingston Benefit Industrially From Water Power Sources.**

R. F. Elliott, chairman of the Utilities' Commission, is achieving an enviable reputation as a booster of cheaper power for eastern Ontario. During his many years' association with power development in this district, he has acquired a valuable fund of information respecting the possibilities of more power at cheaper rates. At the present time he is vice-president of the Eastern Ontario Electrical Union and was chosen by that organization last winter to present the claims of the section for cheaper power before the Hydro-Electric Commission.

Mr. Elliott predicts advantageous developments of power in the future and he is hoping that Kingston will benefit industrially from any sources of cheaper power that may be developed. In addition, he is one of the foremost advocates of an equalized rate for power which will not discriminate in favor of any municipalities, but will give equal privileges to all. At the present time the rate for electrical power in Kingston is \$28 a horsepower and should the rates be equalized it is believed that it will be substantially reduced.

**LISTENED TO IDLE GOSSIP.**

Woman's Tongue Caused a Heap of Trouble for a Citizen.

The penalty of listening to idle gossip, was brought home to a citizen in police court on Monday morning, when he was found guilty of assaulting another citizen, and was fined \$10 and costs.

It was shown in evidence that the citizen listened to some gossip from a woman. The latter told him that the plaintiff in the case had made threats against him. He met the plaintiff and questioned him about the matter. The plaintiff declared he had never made any threats. However, he persisted in the matter, and followed later with an assault on the plaintiff in which his wife also took a hand. It was stated that the woman stuck a hat pin in the plaintiff's ear.

The squabble took place on a street corner, and created some excitement. After hearing all the evidence, Magistrate Farrell, in imposing a fine also reprimanded the accused for having listened to gossip. The woman who was responsible for the gossip was also in court, and the magistrate informed her that she had been the cause of all the trouble.

The case of a citizen charged with being intoxicated, was dismissed.
