HAWKER TO RACE.

Rayham Will Also Try for Gordon Bennett Cup.

Great Britain's contestants in the race for the Gordon Bennett Aviation Cup, which will be held at Elampes, France, on September 28, were selected yesterday by the racing committee of the Royal Aero Club, London.

Harry G. Hawker and F. P. Rayham, who attempted the trans-Atlantic flight in 1919, will compete. Hawker will use a Sopwith Jupiter machine, while Rayham will have a Martinsyde Semiguaver. L. R. Tait Cox, the third entrant, will fly a Nieuport Goshawk plane.

New Pro. Hockey Circuit.

Hamilton will be represented in the newly organized professional hockey league. Toronto, with two clubs, Hamilton and one United States city, probably Cleveland, are already assured, and the chances are that Ottawa will also be included. Next year it is planned to have four American cities represented—Boston, Pittsburg, Cleveland and New York. The artificial ice plant in New York is to be erected in connection with the new baseball ground being built by the New York American League Club.

The new league is a certainty, and will replace the N.H.L. in Toronto.

Don't Like Interference Rule.

In the opinion of Hamilton Tiger officials, who have had a chance to think over the Intercollegiate rules, which the Big Four may adopt this year, the four-yard interference is not a move in the proper direction. The Hamilton men believe that it is getting away from the idea of Canadian rugby and verging close to the American idea of how the game should be played. One official stated last night during a discussion that he thought the tolerance of interference would be playing right into the hands of Frank Shaughnessy, who coaches the McGill team of the Intercollegiate Union.
