SAVING UP FOR A DRY DAY

Joseph Lamarsh Was Caught With the Goods and Fined \$100.

While the average man is endeavoring to save up for a rainy day, Joseph Lamarsh, who claims Quebec as his birthplace, has been saving up for a dry one, and it so happened that a police constable nabbed him carrying a couple of bottles of liquor on Monday. One of the bottles had been opened and sampled. Lamarsh was himself loaded too, so his jail, plus the bottles, made quite a haul. He pleaded guilty to being intoxicated and was stunned when the magistrate imposed a fine of \$100 and costs, as he stated he only had \$2 in his jeans. John Magee was among the tipplers. He admitted being intoxicated, but stated that he had been undergoing medical treatment and had secured liquor from a vendor. Taking an overdose of his medicine cost him a fine of \$10, plus the costs of the court.

According to Joseph Mozier, the Kingston police run in sober men. He was gathered in by Constable Naylon and Leslie Armstrong, in the wee small hours of Tuesday, for being intoxicated but when arraigned before the magistrate, he stoutly denied the charge. Constable Naylon said that Mozier had an automobile and that he was so much under the influence of liquor that he could not crank his car. Constable Armstrong backed up the evidence of Constable Naylon about Mozier being intoxicated. He said he was at the police station when Mozier was brought in; he was so drunk he could not stand. Mozier declared that he had one drink at his home about 10 p.m. The case was enlarged for a day.

More German Dirty Work: Dumping Inferior Goods

Washington, Aug. 31.—Germany is dumping its surplus of inferior goods into Great Britain and United States, and is marking its exports to Great Britain "made in America," and its exports to United States, "Made in England," official advices received here to-day state. German exporters are following this practice, advices said in an effort to regain their former f. reign tado and to realize quickly large sums on manufactured articles which otherwise might not be sold because of popular prejudice. Such tactics are discrediting United States manufacturers in Great Britain and British manufacturers in United States, the advices declared.

BELFAST RIOTING CAUSED TWENTY DEATHS

Only Outbreak on Tuesday Was the Stoning of Foundry Employees.

Belfast, Aug. 31.—Nine persons are dead as the result of yesterday's rioting in this city, another man being killed last night and two of those wounded in yesterday's disorders, dying. Revised reports as to casualties show that since the rioting began last Wednesday, twenty have been killed and two hundred injured. Today the only actual outbreak reported was the stoning of employees of Mackie's foundry in the notorious Kashmir Road district, but groups of men collected at many corners gave unmistakable indications that trouble might come.

The Prince of Wales arrived Monday at Honolulu on the battleship Renown. No ceremony marked his arrival. The Prince will remain there three days.
