If you could attend one of the regular luncheon-meetings of Allen Theatre managers, you would find that the subjects discussed are similar to those debated by the people who patronize the theatres.

In no other way could the Allen Theatre Enterprises secure the viewpoint of the theatre patron more effectively than through the medium of these meetings. A score or more of these "branch managers" get together at frequent intervals, and discuss every picture, past, present and future, with which they are concerned.

Pictures are brought up for criticism. One manager will report that his patronage was large and satisfied, while another will explain why a different section of the community did not respond to the same photoplay.

Sometimes there is uniform disappointment regarding the worth of a certain film, and again there will be a chorus of approval. But out of these meetings may be derived a fairly accurate estimate of the public attitude toward a particular picture.

In one sense these meetings are the court of appeal for the public. Anyone may influence the course of the modern picture by giving intelligent expression to his opinion of any film shown at an Allen Theatre. Criticism is welcomed, but the patron should consider to make his criticism constructive.

The opinions of "the patronage" do count with the managers and with the Allen Selection Board; these meetings are the link between the public and the producers of pictures. Your influence counts there. It is a phase of Allen policy, that the opinions of the public influence the producers of pictures.
