This game ought to be of exceptional interest as each team has won one game in previous contests and the game on Saturday will be the "rubber."

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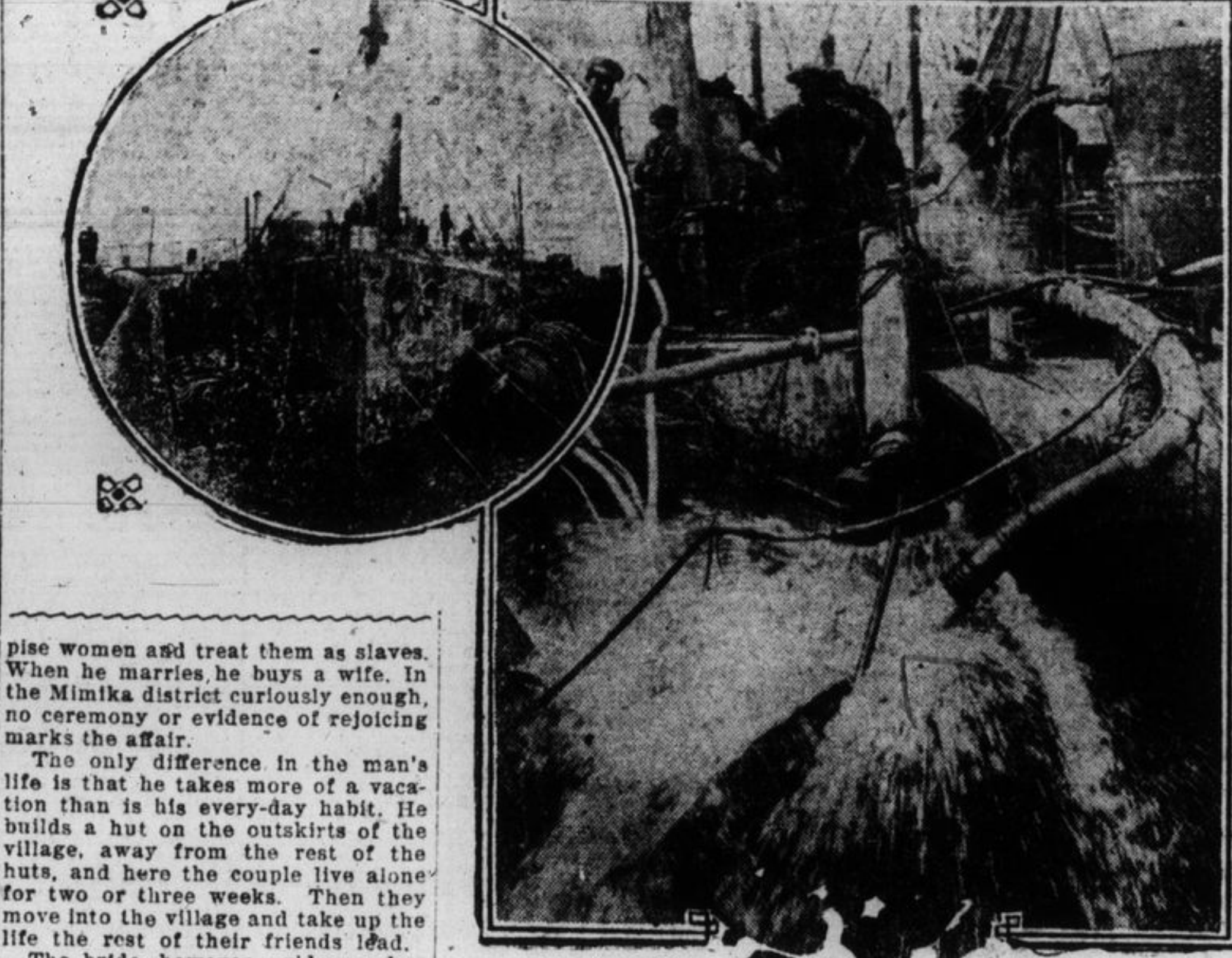
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THE VINDICTIVE REFLAGGED AT OSTEND.
