### Addison Scott Stricken While Getting Mail at Napanee Post Office.

Napanee, Sept. 8.—The death occurred on Sunday night of Edward Francisco, a well-known and respected citizen of Napanee in his sixty-fourth year. Deceased had been making his home with Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hunter for the last thirty-three years. He had been in failing health for the past four months. He leaves one son, Walter B. Francisco, London, Ont. The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon from the residence of W. H. Hunter, John street, interment at Riverside cemetery.

Death came very suddenly on Tuesday evening to Addison Scott, a well-known resident of Napanee. He was in the post office for the evening mail when he was stricken with heart failure. He leaves one daughter, Edith, and two sons, Roy and Blake. His wife predeceased him just a few months ago. He retired from active work on the farm last winter and has been living in Napanee since then.

Another sudden death was that of Nathan Fellows, a life long resident of Napanee. He was taken ill on Monday night, and died at nine o'clock on Tuesday morning. He was seventy-one years of age. He leaves besides his sorrowing widow, two sons, Arthur and Harold, and one sister, Mrs. Parrott, Napanee. The funeral will take place from the late residence, East street, on Thursday afternoon.

### PAYS VETERAN'S DEBT RATHER THAN SEIZE

Bailiff at Trenton Performs an Act That Calls for Admiration.

Trenton, Sept. 8.—Pte. Earl W. Cronkright, of this town, who will be a cripple all his life as the result of a hip wound received at Arras, was last week visited by Bailiff Mumford with a distress warrant to seize his chattels to pay a debt of \$12.85 due the local Hydro-Electric people for thawing out frozen pipes last January. Mr. Cronkright has a wife and one little child, and his wife is in a delicate condition. A few days ago Cronkright returned from Toronto, where he was before the medical board.

The bailiff sought the protection of Chief of Police William Bain and Constable John G. White, fearing trouble in making the seizure. When the two got to the soldier's home they found a very lame man, a sick woman, and an infant. The furniture consisted of a bed, a couch and a chair, all of which the bailiff would have taken. When Cronkright told them his story Constable Wright pulled out his pocket book and paid the bill.

Cronkright had disputed the Hydro account, claiming the work was not properly done.
