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#### Their Fight Against the Poles---Germans With the Bolsheviki.

Warsaw, Sept. 8. - Conditions along the Lithuanian front are be coming more serious doily and, according to the latest reports, Poles and Lithuanians are fighting spasmodically across an improvised frontier. In one action, two Lithuanian officers and two hundred men were captured by the Poles. German and Russian Bolsheviki are aiding the Lithuanians, it is contended by the Polish authorities.

The latter, however. contend they have not crossed the demarkation line fixed by the Allies. Trotzky is asserted to be carrying on a campaign of propaganda declaring that "the Polish invasion" threatens Lithuanian independence, and at the Poles be expelled at all costs.


