THE PREMIER'S ADDRESS TO THE R.M.C. CADETS

He Advises Them to Make Self-Reliance the Key-stone of Success.

Hon. Arthur Meighen and Sir Henry Drayton paid a visit to the Royal Military College on Thursday afternoon. They were met by Major-General Sir A. C. Macdonell, C.M.G., K.C.M.G., D.S.O., commandant of the college. In introducing Premier Meighen, General Macdonell paid a high tribute to his outstanding abilities and his great courage.

He told of his visit to the Canadian troops while at the front in France, and of his address to the First Division on that occasion. Premier Meighen thanked Gen. Macdonell for his kindly reference to him and congratulated the college upon having him as commandant, for he always regarded example as being better than inspiration. The premier referred to the contribution of the college to the manhood of Canada and the noble example of its graduates during the great war. He advised the cadets to put their best into their work at all times, because by doing so they learned the way to success. He regarded the years between sixteen and twenty as the glory of life and the time well spent bore fruit an hundred fold. He warned them against the tendency of today to attribute reverses to the failure of others. Get away from that habit and make self-reliance the key-stone of success, was his advice.
