### Ponies Took the Game From Belleville, Saturday

Ponies clapped the lid on Belleville on Saturday afternoon with the little shut-out of three runs, in what will probably be the last senior game on the Cricket Field this year. The game was of exceptional interest because each team had a well-known south-paw in the box and the fans have long been hoping to see a contest between Goyer and Gallagher. Both hurlers threw a good game, with Goyer leading in strike-outs, although he was hit more often than Gallagher. Their work on Saturday was pretty evenly matched. Gallagher struck out ten, walked four and suffered three hits as compared with Goyer's twelve strike-outs, one walk, and five hits.

Ted Saunders at short was the hero of the game. He made some sensational pick-ups, stops and throws, and walloped out a homer with Cherry on second base. Cherry, Coyne and Stewart, in the field, deserve credit for some good catches and Coyne was the author of a neat double play on a running catch and a line throw to first.

The Belleville team played ball all the way through, although there were one or two slips. Mills, catcher, was playing under the handicap of a badly hurt ankle, while Goyer had a pretty sore throwing hand, to buck against. In the return game with Ponies they will likely give a better account of themselves and the locals will have to work to bring home a victory.

### RECORD FIELD AWAITS HAVRE DE GRACE OPENING

About 700 thoroughbreds of various ages, whose owners are the leading sportsmen of the country, are assembled at the picturesquely situated race course of the Hartford Agricultural and Breeder's association, Havre De Grace, Md., where on Saturday was inaugurated Maryland's season of autumn racing. There will be sixty-eight days of sport in the Old Line state this fall. Upwards of \$750,000 will be distributed among horsemen in the course of the meeting at Havre De Grace, Laurel Park, Pimlico and Bowie, which will follow in the order named.

The Havre De Grace meeting promising a record field, will be signalized by renewals of the Eastern Shore, Potomac and Havre De Grace handicaps as well as of the Hartford county handicap. The Eastern Shore, Potomac and Havre De Grace are \$10,000 races for 2-year-olds exclusively, 3-year-olds exclusively and 3-year-olds and over, respectively, at three-quarters of a mile, one mile and a sixteenth and one mile and a furlong. They should develop brilliant sport.

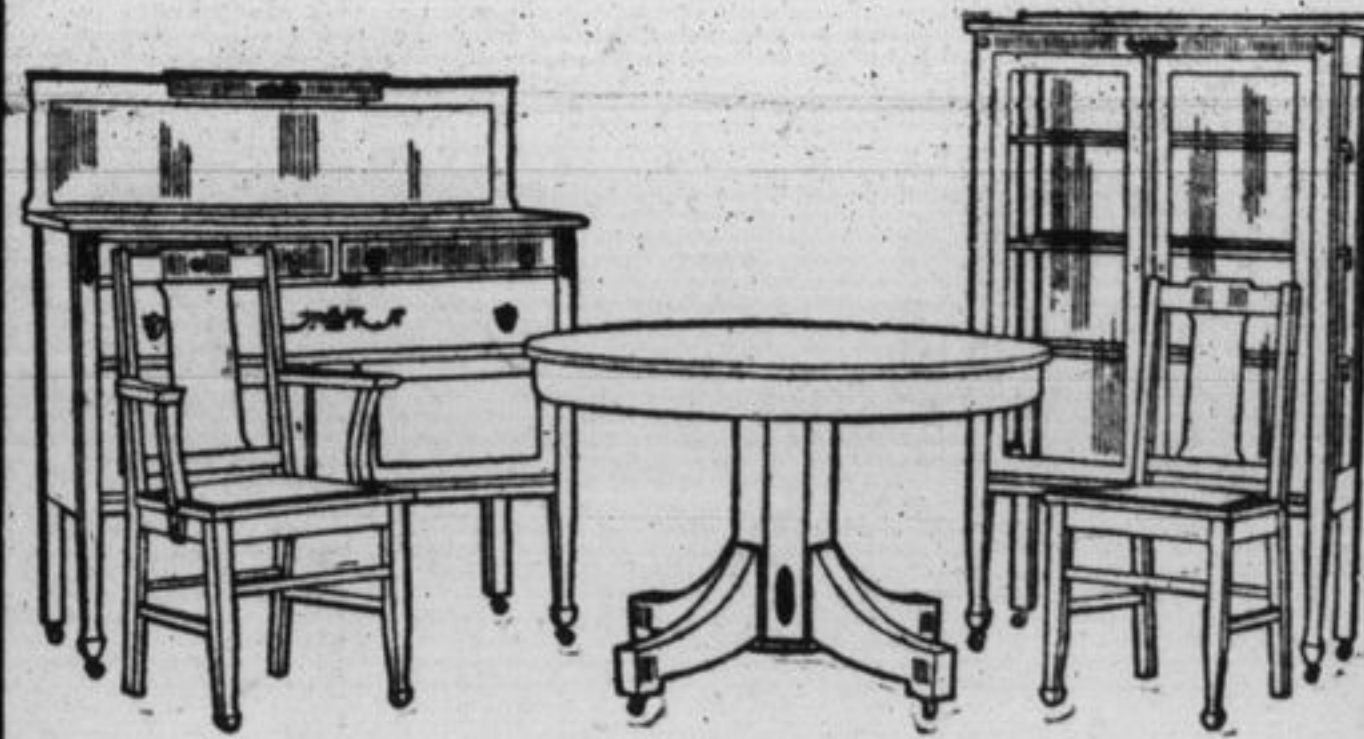
Gilhooley Joins Argonauts.

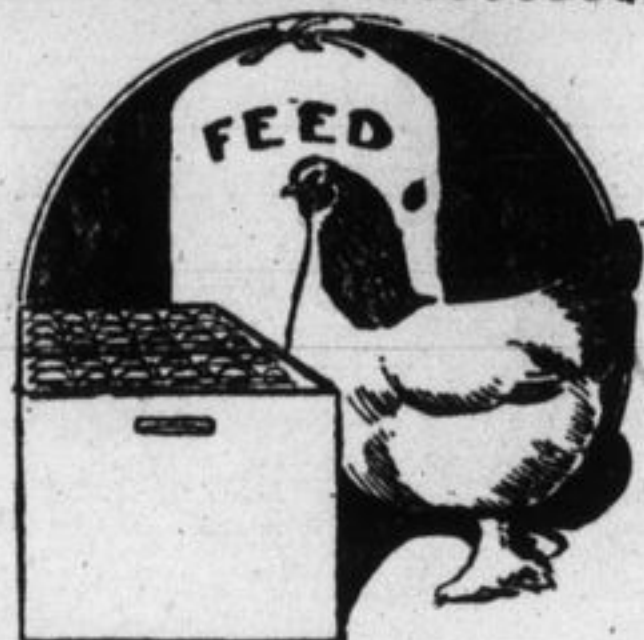
