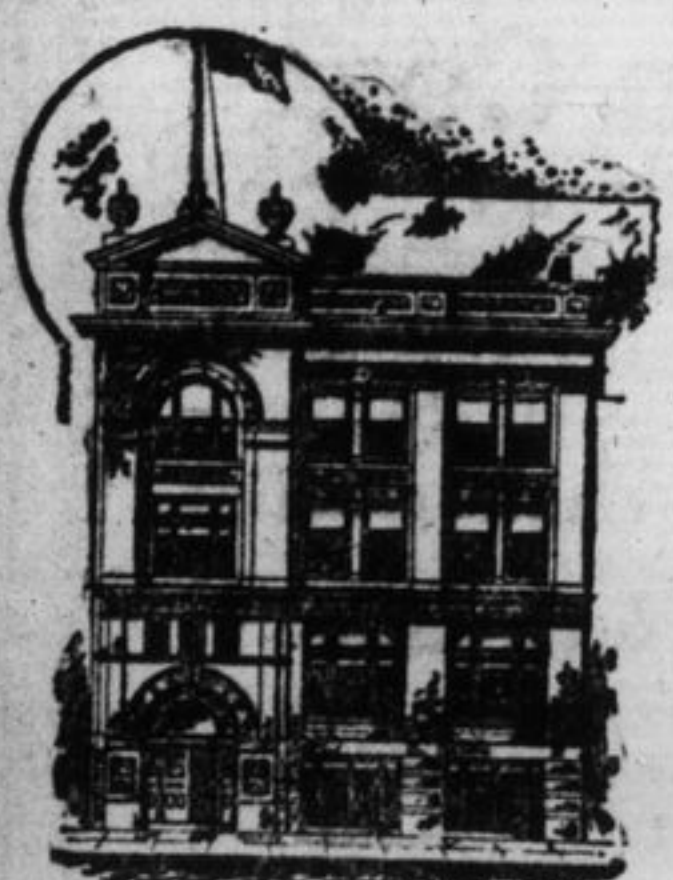


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out his consent, but the magistrate advised the parent to make no trouble as the girl was already married and liked the man she had espoused, which was really good advice.
