SEEK LOWER POWER RATES

Chairman R. F. Elliott to Consult With Hydro-Electric Commission.

Chairman R. F. Elliott was requested by the Public Utilities Commission at its meeting Monday afternoon to open negotiations with the provincial Hydro-Electric Commission with the object in view of securing a further reduction in power rates in Kingston. Mayor Nickle brought the matter to the attention of the Utilities Commission at its last meeting, claiming that there should be a further reduction of at least ten per cent in the power rates, in view of the \$43,000 surplus of last year. For the first six months of this year the electrical surplus is understood to be over \$20,000. The city council passed a resolution two weeks ago asking the local commission to make a ten per cent reduction. The local commissioners are satisfied that such a reduction can be made, in fact after this year's surplus is made known a still greater reduction in the power rates may be in order. However Chairman Elliott will take up the matter with the Beck commission and see what can be done.

It was reported that the Hydro-Electric commission's bill for power supplied in August was \$4,585. Of this amount \$500 was sold to the Campbell power company at Kingston Mills.

Chairman Elliott made a report as to the electrical meeting in Hamilton last week and spoke chiefly with regard to the request to be made to the government to turn the Central Ontario water power plants over to the provincial commission. The chairman said he desired to correct a view held by the civic authorities with regard to the surplus held by the Utilities Commission. He said that the Hydro-Electric act did not permit the surplus each year to be handed over to the municipal council. All that could be handed over was the surplus which might be shown to have been created from the sale of power to the street railway company and from street lighting.

Manager Folger reported that the new gas apparatus was being well installed and would be completed shortly. The commission, he said, is still paying twenty-three cents a gallon for oil.

In attendance were Chairman Elliott, G. Y. Chown, Mayor Nickle and Thomas Hewitt.

Capt. C. H. Nicholson's New Posts
Captain S. H. Nicholson, head of the G. T. R. steamship service in B. C., has been notified of his appointment as manager of all floating equipment of the Canadian national railways. This will include the management of all the present and future passenger and freight vessels plying under the Canadian national railway management. Captain Nicholson's office will remain in Vancouver. Captain Nicholson was formerly a popular commander at Kingston, having been in command of the steamer Hero and afterwards of the North King.
