AWARDED \$6,000 DAMAGES

ly at what points the whistle had been sounded.

**\$6,000 For Plaintiff.**  
At noon on Wednesday, the jury awarded Smith Elliott \$6,000 damages.

The following is a list of the questions submitted to the jury by Justice Lennox with the answers: "Were the injuries complained of caused by the company's negligence?" "Yes." "If you say 'yes,' what were the acts of negligence to which you refer. Answer fully." "That the grade or elevation of the approach to the track was higher than the law allowed; that the roughness of the road on the company's property made it difficult to approach or go over the track, taking all the attention of the driver to make the grade. There is no doubt in the minds of the jury that the height and number of trees obstructed the view of the track at certain places, and that these should not have been allowed to grow on the company's property." "Notwithstanding the negligence of the company, could the plaintiff by the exercise of reasonable care have avoided the accident?" "Yes."

"If you answer 'yes' to the last question, in what way did the plaintiff fail to exercise reasonable care?" "Plaintiff did not stop his car or look toward approaching train, owing to the fact that he did not hear any whistle; that the difficult approach to the track took all his attention to drive his car."

Damages assessed at \$6,000. Out of pocket expenses, less \$200 on price of car \$2,939; personal damages \$3,061. L. C. Lockett was foreman of the jury, and the other members were: W. C. Kent, Maitland Lake, Sanford Lakins, J. F. Card, William Bolton, Jr., Michael Daly, Frederick Baker, William Smith, H. S. Godfrey, Thomas Moran and Samuel T. Lilley.

The case of Mrs. Flora Knott vs. George E. Smith and Mary Couper, was commenced Wednesday forenoon. In this case, Mrs. Knott is suing for damages as the result of injuries she received four months ago, when she was hit by Mr. Smith's auto near the corner of Brock and Clarence streets.
