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"THE PLACE TO GET THAT RECORD"

THE BASEBALL PARKS NOT LARGE ENOUGH To Create New Attendance Records at the World's Series of Games.

Notwithstanding the general increase in baseball throughout the country it is unlikely that in the coming series to decide the world's championship that new records will be made in attendance for a single game or for the series. The reason for this is that the capacity of the parks where the games are to be played is insufficient to erase from the record books the top notch-figures that have been established in previous years.

The largest crowd that ever witnessed a single game in a world's series was 42,620, which was the announced official attendance for the final contest of the 1916 series between the Boston Red Sox of the American League and Brooklyn of the National League, played at Boston. The best record for total attendance at a series was made in 1912, when the Boston team of the American League and the New York team of the National League played to 251,501 persons in eight games.

Ebbets Field, the home grounds of the Brooklyn club of the National League, has been tested to its capacity in one world's series, that of 1916, and while it is possible for between 22,000 and 23,000 to crowd into the stands and pavilions, the largest official attendance there in the 1916 series was 21,662. The park of the contending clubs for the American League pennant show no possibilities for new attendance figures.

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for a single game, or the likelihood of a new record for the series when paired with the comparatively small capacity of Ebbets Field. The seating capacity of the park at Cleveland is approximately 20,700, while that of the Chicago White Sox is in the neighborhood of 35,000. The largest number that has attended a world's series game at the grounds of the White Sox was 34,379, the official attendance at the fifth game of the series between the White Sox and Cincinnati last year.

Thus it is apparent that it will be impossible for any of the parks where the coming world series will be played to eclipse for a single game the attendance of 42,620 established at Boston in 1916, and even with the blue ribbon event of baseball being decided in a five out of nine series, the records established last year will be impossible for the year to come. The National and American League winners to combine to beat the attendance record of 251,901 in the series between the Red Sox and Giants in 1912 except under unusual conditions and interest.

If a pennant or a world's championship had just been won it would have been no greater cause for celebration than the news of the indictment and suspension of the White Sox players was today to the other boys of the team who were above reproach. Within an hour after the news broke the "right" fellows of the Sox team were holding a party celebrating a celebration that lasted most of the night. They gathered in a downtown restaurant for dinner. They assembled later, with some additional members, at the apartment of Captain Eddie Collins, and at midnight, in Capt. Collins' home, the boys were still going. It was true that the suspension of the eight stars apparently had wrecked all remaining hopes of a pennant, but a load carried by the "right" fellows all through this season had been lifted and they simply had to explode. To begin with, a few members of the team suspected or had a hunch of big things taking place at the Criminal Court. An automobile with some of them, including Eddie Collins, Eddie Murphy, Amos Strunk and Nemo Leibold, pulled a block or two away from the building Sam Bass, one of the players, and witness in the investigation, went to the court room. The dinner down town followed, and the party was augmented by the presence of Terry and Daly, both of the Cubs, who once wore White Sox players.

"No one will ever know what we put up with all this summer," one of the party said. "I don't know how we ever got along, I know there were many times when things were about to break into a fight, but it never got that far. Nearly every one of us has not talked with any of those fellows except on the field, and since the season opened. Even during the batting practice our gang stood in one group, waiting a turn to hit, and the other gang had a group of his own. We had to trail along with these fellows all summer, and all the time felt that they had thrown us down."

GIRL CADDIE "MASTER" OF JOB AT MONTREAL

One of the hardest problems faced by the average clubs of Canada is the question of caddies. As a general rule, courses in the larger centres are situated many miles from a city and it is almost impossible to secure a sufficient supply of boys. Then, too, the ordinary Canadian kiddie does not seem to take kindly to the task of carrying a golf bag. He prefers to spend his summer holidays at the swimming hole and playing baseball, instead of adding a dollar or so a day to the family expenses. Two years ago the Royal Montreal Golf Club introduced as an experiment girl caddies and at that prominent club there are now twenty-six such caddies on the roster. They have proved a great success in every way, so much so, in fact, that one of the number, Jennie Mohare, has now been installed as caddie master, and has complete control of all caddies, both boys and girls. It is the united opinion of the club officials that Jennie is the best caddie master that the Royal Montreal has ever had. It would not be surprising if clubs throughout Canada the coming season followed in the footsteps of the Royal Montreal, and that in the years to come the bare-footed, freckle-faced boy with his all too great a penchant for yelling friendly but raucous greetings to a chum across the course, just at the moment of making a most critical shot, will only be a haunting memory.

THE RULES OF GOLF AGAIN CHANGED

Changes in the rules of golf, framed after a consultation with the American, Canadian and South African delegates, were this week approved of by the Royal and Ancient Club at St. Andrews. Chief of these were:

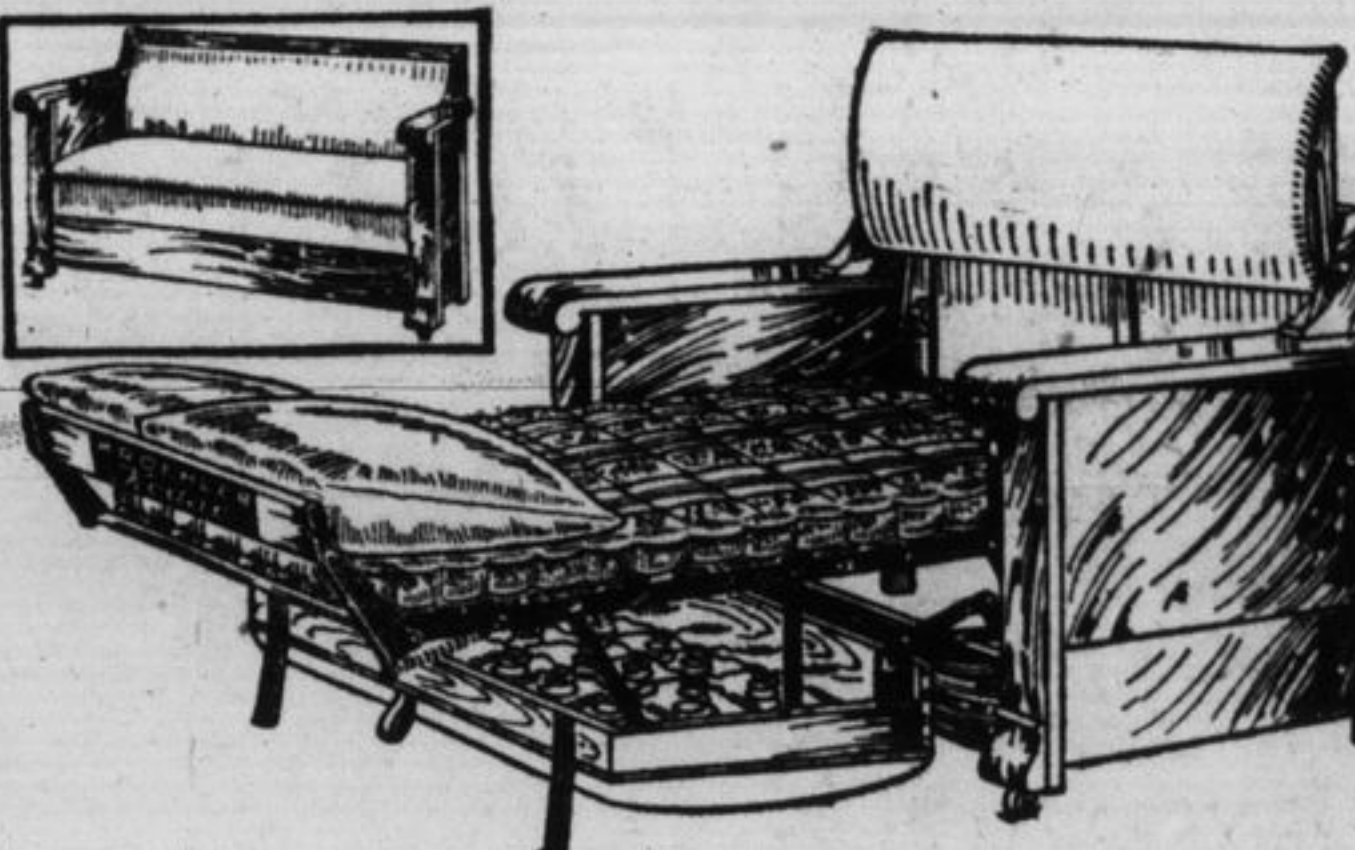
1. The adoption of a standard ball which corresponds with a ball familiarly known to all golfers as the 30. It is a fraction of an ounce lighter than the most popular ball, the 31, but the size permitted is the merest fraction less.

2. Unification of the penalty for lost ball, ball out of bounds, and unplayable ball. In future this is to be loss of stroke and distance.
