SUPPORT PROTEST AT RUGBY MEETING

Montreal Football Club Taking Exception to Two Rulings Made.

The Montreal Gazette says: Determination to see it through was expressed at a meeting of the Montreal Football Club, held last night at the Westmount club-house, when the question of protesting Saturday's match was thoroughly discussed. As a result a statement has been prepared and will be forwarded to the executive of the Inter-Provincial Rugby Union.

Two points are indicated as forming ground for protest. One is that a try made by Potticary was disallowed; the other hinges on the delicate situation leading up to the final play, when Argos went over for a try, which furnished the points to win the game.

In the case of Potticary it was ruled at the time that the ball was out of play. This is contested by the Montreal club.

As to the other event it is asserted that Ken Barwick, the Montreal captain, had possession of the ball, close to the Montreal line, and despite his claim of "held," was shoved back across the line, and that when the mass was untangled the oval was found in the possession of an Argonaut player. The ball was then carried two yards in the field and Argonaut given possession.

The Montreal club contends that if it was Argos' ball, the play should have been called a try. But the ball having been brought back to where Barwick held, it should have been given to Montreal, and not to the Argos. On this play hinged the result of the game.

He saw a good deal of active service during the war with the Scottish Regiment in France, and like nearly every British sportsman of military age, can claim to have "done his bit."

Giants Invade Cuba. Thirteen members of the New York National League baseball team left here for Havana yesterday to play a series of sixteen exhibition games with Cuban teams beginning next Saturday. John J. McGraw, manager of the Giants, will join them later this month. Johnny Evers is in charge of the party.

SHARKEY BOXES WILDE

ON DECEMBER 15TH Jack Sharkey, New York bantam, has signed contracts calling for \$45,000 worth of work inside of the next two months. On October 15th he will draw down \$6,000 for boxing Jabez White; October 19th at Boston, with Young Montreal, he gets a guarantee of \$4,000, and on November 15th, over the fifteen-round decision route at Madison Square Garden, taking "Joe" Lynch on for a return bout, he gets a guarantee of \$10,000, with an option of 25 per cent. of the gross receipts.

Manager Joe Wagner, with Sharkey, will leave for England for a 20-round decision battle with Jimmy Wilde at London December 15th, receiving a guarantee of \$25,000 with training and travelling expenses.

BOXING TROUBLES.

It looks as though the Ontario Boxing and Athletic Commission are likely to have their hands full during the ensuing winter. They have already received several applications for permits for boxing bouts in various parts of the Province. In some cases sanction has already been given but in other cases the board are satisfying themselves beyond all doubt as to the bona fides of the proposed exhibition before granting the permits and references from the chief of police or mayor of the cities in which the bouts are asked for are being called for. Before granting permits, too, the Commission require to be furnished with the names of the intending contestants, who will not be allowed to engage in a bout unless they have first secured a license from

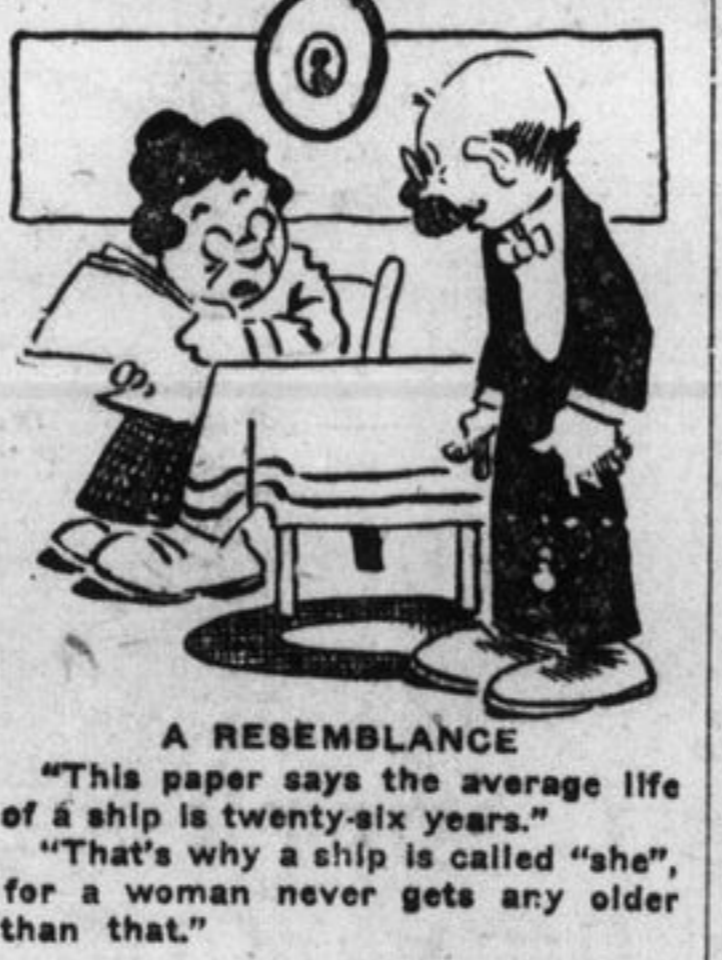

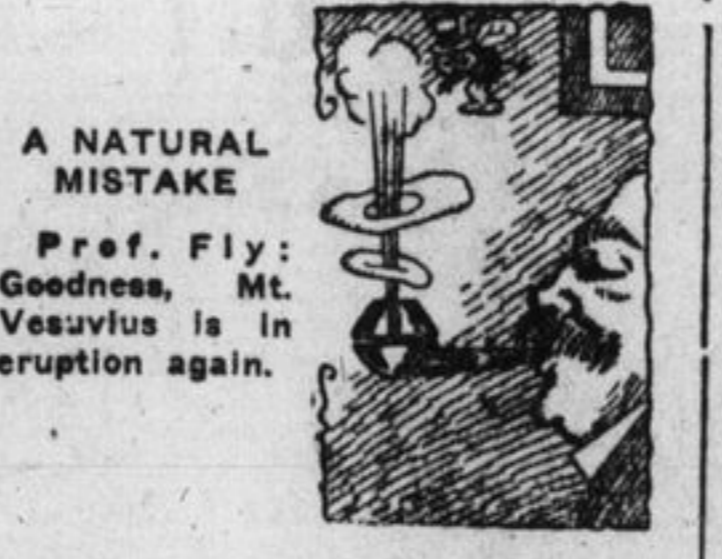

TAX PLAYERS' SHARE.

New York State to Take Percentage For Income Tax.

The long arm of the law in New York State will reach out for taxes due from about 125 baseball players sharing in the receipts of the world's series. Under the terms of the recently enacted income tax law in this state, not only will the players who live within the state be taxed on their share of the receipts of the world's series, but other states as well. The law affects not only the Cleveland and Brooklyn players, but the runners-up and third teams in each league—Chicago and New York in the American, and New York and Cincinnati in the National. The non-resident players, it was explained today, are taxable because they rendered "personal services" in New York. The National Commission will take out from the checks to non-residents an amount sufficient to pay the tax, whenever their shares are greater than the exemption allowed by the law.

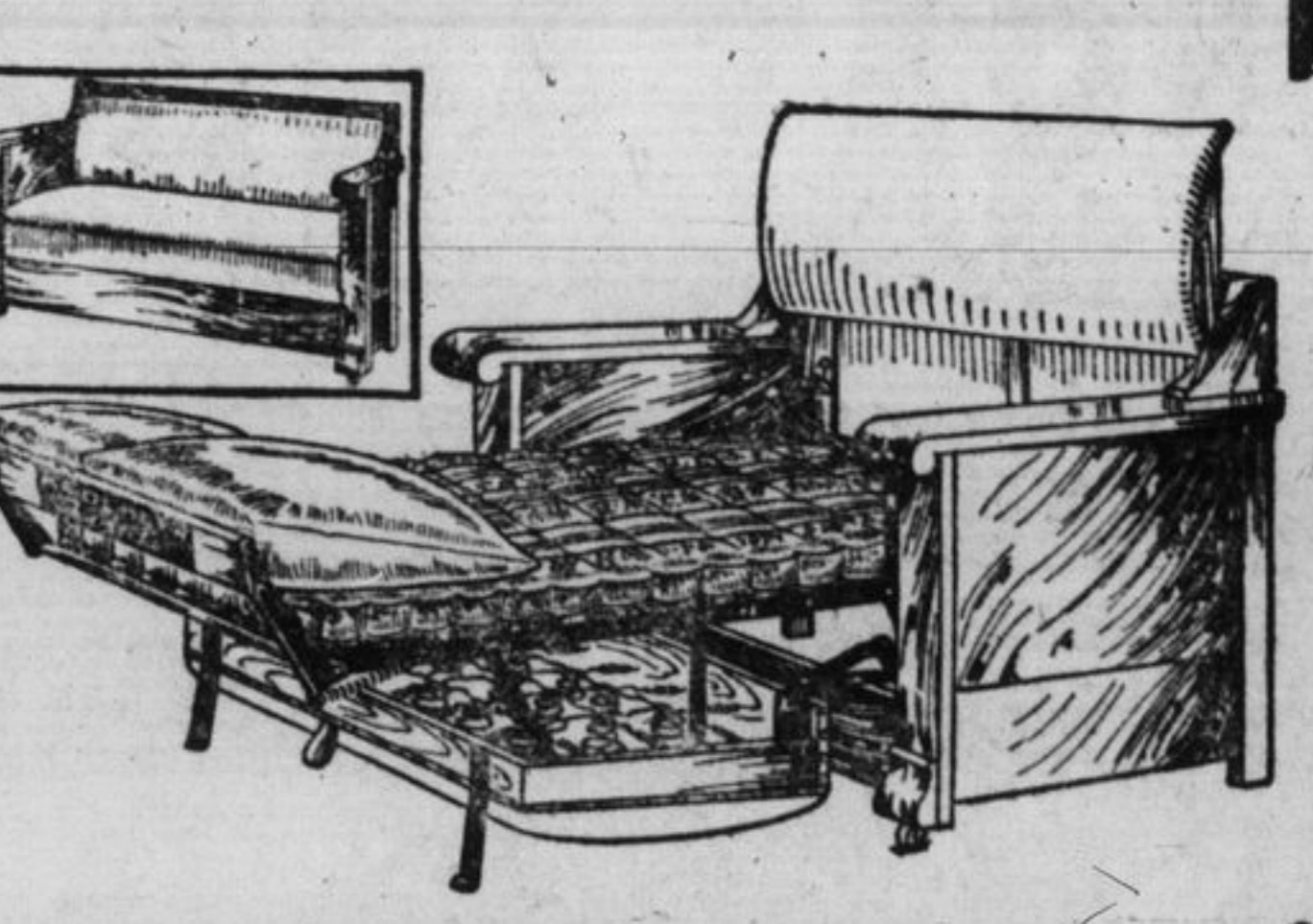
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
