MAY DECLARE VESSEL WAR

Report That Canadian Co. Will Have Competitor—Playfair Purchases Boats.

An Ogdensburg, N.Y., despatch says: The ever increasing freight and passenger traffic on the lakes and the St. Lawrence bid fair in the near future and probably next season, to precipitate a steamship war that will be far-reaching in its effects and overtop any similar battle for supremacy in the steamship business on the majestic stream.

For some time past, it is alleged, there has been a growing tension between the James Playfair interests and that of the Canada Steamship Lines, Ltd. Mr. Playfair is a resident of Midland, Ont., and reckoned a multi-millionaire. He is the principal owner of a large fleet of boats that ply in the freight trade on the Great Lakes.

During and since the war, the steamship business on the lakes and the St. Lawrence has doubled, if not tripled, and large sums of money have been made. It is understood that Mr. Playfair believes that the increasing business warrants a competing company to divide the freight traffic with the Canada Steamship Lines, between the lakes and Montreal.

It is stated that with this end in view, Mr. Playfair recently purchased the fine steel steamers, Huron, Minneapolis, St. Paul and William Castle Rhodes from Charles W. Morse, of New York. They are to be brought back at once to the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence river service.

The purchase of these splendid vessels will very greatly strengthen Mr. Playfair in his alleged impending battle with the Canada Steamship Lines, Ltd. Saturday that Mr. Playfair has options on several new steel ships which are now in salt water and which he is very likely to gobble up.

The Playfair fleet now consists in addition to those listed above of the following boats: Glenbrae, Glenadam, Glencairn, Glenallan, Glenfinnan, Glenfoyle, Glenisle, Glenlivet, Glenyon, Glenmorris, Glenmount, Glenorchy, Glenshee, and Glenstrivlyn.

All of these boats are now in the freight business on the upper lakes and at the present time Mr. Playfair is adding to his St. Lawrence river fleet canal sized boats.

Mr. Playfair is one of the most successful steamboat men of Canada, and if the impending battle between the Playfair interests and the Canada Steamship Lines, Ltd., develops, there will surely be merry times in the steamboat traffic on the St. Lawrence.

The Canada Steamship Lines, Ltd., is one of the wealthiest and most substantial steamboat concerns whose vessels ply river and lakes. In marine circles here, it was never believed that the supremacy of the Canada Steamship Lines, Ltd., would ever be questioned. In fact, it was never thought that any capitalists would have the courage or stamina to antagonize the powerful Canada Steamship Lines, Ltd., in an attempt to seize from it its proud supremacy in the navigation business of the St. Lawrence.

But Mr. Playfair is said to be a man of indomitable courage and backbone and when he undertakes to do a thing, he does not know the meaning of the word fail.

It is for this reason that marine men are now all agog over the report that has become current of the impending fight between the Canada Steamship Lines, Ltd., and the Playfair interests for control of the lakes and river freight traffic. Should the fight be precipitated, millions of dollars will be involved in the outcome.

The Playfair interests are now engaged, it is understood, strengthening their weak points, preparatory to springing the battle and shooting their first guns at the opening of the navigation season for 1921.

JUST ONE FAILURE IN LARGE DISTRICT

More Than a Hundred Soldier Farms Visited Show Satisfactory Progress.

In a district of Alberta, near the Saskatchewan border on the Canadian Northern Railway, there are 123 soldier settlers on the land who were visited by the Soldier Settlement Board inspector recently, and he gives his opinion that all, with the possible exception of one, will make good. The exception is a half-breed farmer whose wife deserted him, and, by reason of that domestic affliction, he is not making the progress he should. Crops were exceedingly good throughout the whole of the district and some of the settlers are expecting to pay their entire indebtedness to the board out of this year's proceeds.

To mention a few of the farms visited, one man borrowed \$4,000 from the board: He had this year eighty acres of oats and expects to thresh about 5,000 bushels, in addition to which he has ten acres of green feed. Another man whose loan for the purchase of land was \$3,500 will thresh about 500 bushels of oats and he has five acres of green feed and thirty-five acres of summer fallow. A third man borrowed \$2,250. He has seventy-five acres in crop and raises considerable stock, having at present ninety head of cattle and sixteen horses. Still another man has sixty acres of fall crop, thirty-five head of cattle and five horses which he purchased without the assistance of the board. This man received a stock and equipment loan of \$1,000 and another loan for the removal of an encumbrance. He will sell twenty head of stock to liquidate his debts and will have 2,000 bushels of oats to sell. One of the youngest settlers purchased a half-section through the board at \$13.60 an acre. He has fenced all his land, broken eight acres and is now hauling lumber to build.

The report says that these cases are quite typical of the soldier settlers in the district, many of whom are now well established farmers and producing large crops.
