**A Lad's Crime.**

**The Rights of a Drunk.**

**Silo Collapses.**

The silo was a wood stave one and had recently been erected. It had just been filled with corn husks and cobs, the immense weight of which proved too much for the strength of the hoops. The silo is a total wreck and there will also be a heavy loss in silage.

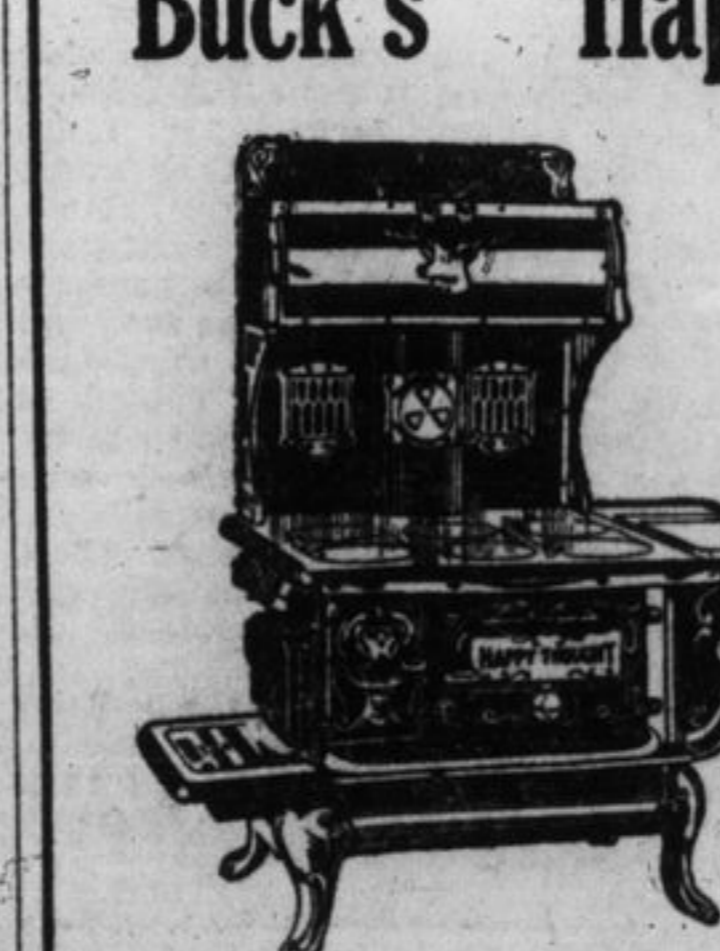
