VACCINATION IS REQUIRED

The School Children Must be Made Immune From Smallpox.

The Board of Health has decided to require all children attending the city schools to be vaccinated against smallpox. It had a special meeting on Tuesday afternoon to consider the question, and the members agreed that the only way to prevent an epidemic of smallpox was to resort to vaccination. With the coming of cool weather and the buddling of people together in houses, the danger of epidemic increases. In order that there may be no necessity later on of perhaps closing public assembly places, the Board of Health at this early date decides to require vaccination of all school children. It also recommends vaccination of other children not of school age and of adults who have not been vaccinated for seven years. 
