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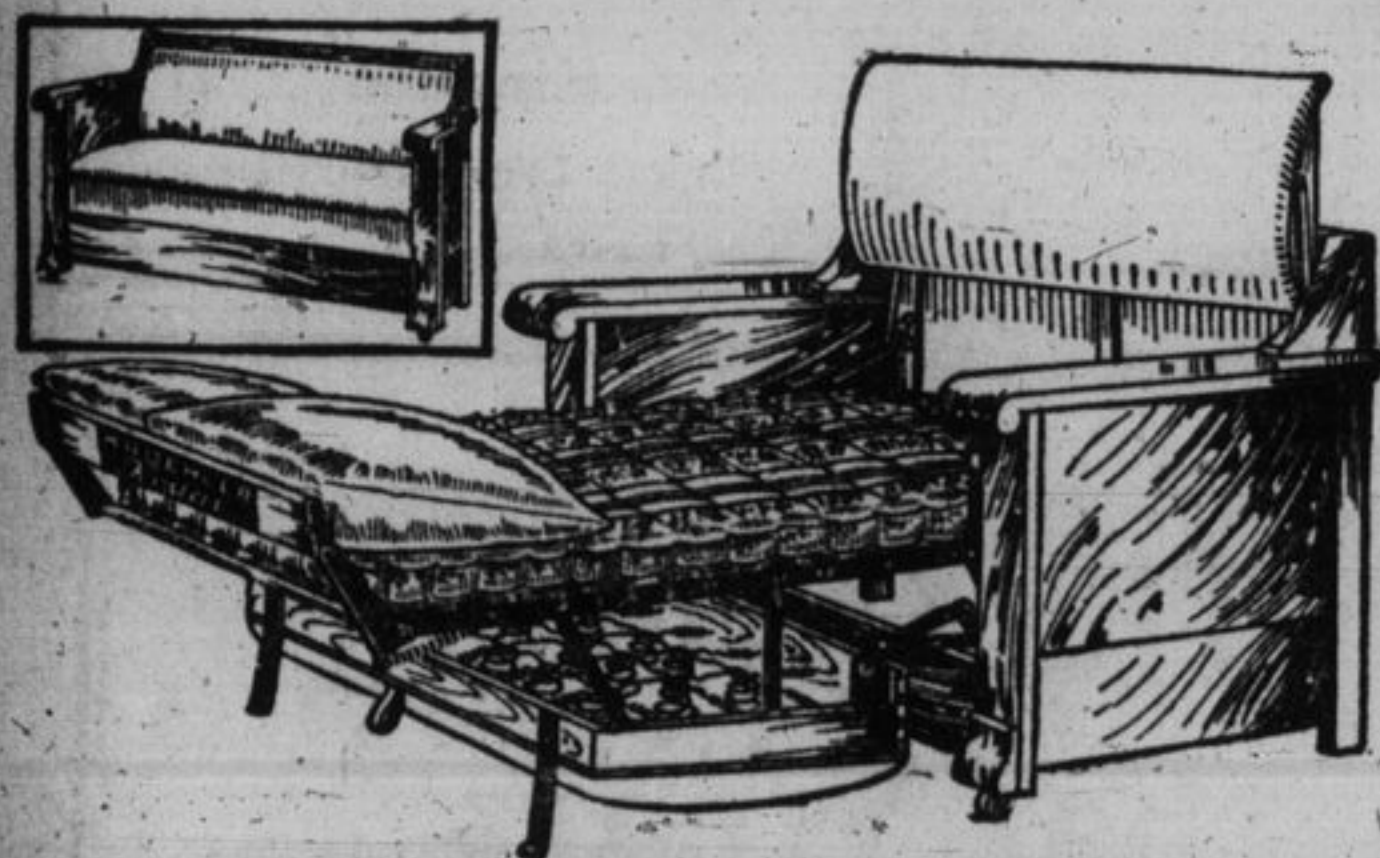

DISCUSSED IN ENGLAND.

Abuse is heaped on the so-called shamateur—the amateur who steps across the thin line of technicality by accepting huge expense accounts and soft jobs so he can live comfortably and still be an amateur.

### REBUILDING WHITE SOX.

The Chicago White Sox have started to rebuild their shattered machine, according to reports.  
The once scrappy Hoos, wrecked when seven of its players were indicted for throwing the 1919 world series, are badly in need of top-notch ball players and Charles A. Comiskey, owner, is said to have offered the Baltimore club \$50,000 for three players. Two more players are sought from the St. Louis club, it was said. Comiskey is said to be willing to pay the Saints \$30,000 for the two players he is believed to be after.

The Orioles' Comiskey is reported to be after Jack Bentley, south-paw pitcher, and Phil Holten, outfielder. Bentley pitched sixteen victories for Baltimore last season and only lost three games. In addition he clubbed out twenty homers.  
The St. Paul men reported sought are Catcher Hargrave and Outfielder Elmer Miller.

He is now at Xalapa Farm, near Paris, Ky., where he will receive his first conditioning. Eternal is in fine condition, and has always been sound. He could have been brought to the races this year, but Mr. McClelland had so many horses racing in the east and west that he decided to give this son of Sweep a rest for the season.

### SPORT NOTES.

Postor of Veterinary College won the points championship at the annual University of Toronto track and field meet.  
Toronto Arena Gardens, Limited, has lost its appeal against the verdict awarding upwards of \$20,000 to the Toronto Hockey Club.  
Most of the professional gamblers who engineered the betting coup in connection with the world series last year have disappeared.  
Two hundred boxers have reported to the coach at the University of Toronto. The sport is being introduced in high schools throughout Ontario.  
The baseball team of the University of Southern California is planning for a tour of Japan next summer to play the teams of Japanese universities.  
Vardon and Ray, British pro. golfers, are preparing for another invasion of Canada before returning to England.

Plummer, has made an offer to the Professional Golfers' Association to raise by popular subscription enough money to send from twelve to twenty "pros" abroad in 1921. It is reasoned that there is little chance for a golfer from the United States to win the British open title when but one or two make the attempt, whereas if a dozen or so were to attempt the task the chances of victory would be much greater.

### COBB NOT EAGER TO BECOME A MANAGER

Ty Cobb, champion baseball player of all time, has no desire to become a manager—he just wants to be a player. Cobb is in San Francisco to play in a series of exhibition games. He admitted he had received offers to manage the Detroit Tigers. He said:  
"I am not figuring on becoming a manager right now. I never had any managerial experience and I don't crave it. Of course, you can't tell what will happen in time. When I'm through making hits and scoring runs and catching flies, I may take a whirl at running some ball club. I believe I am good for two or three years as a player."

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## The White-Tailed Deer
