FIELD GOAL KICKING DECLINES IN CANADA

A Toronto sporting writer says: Field goal kicking is not, apparently, considered by Canadian coaches and players as big a factor in football as it is in the United States, and was in Canada twelve, fifteen and twenty years ago. But it is still one of the most striking offensive features of the game, and should not be overlooked in the development of the teams it has, however, been neglected in recent years, with the result that there is not a senior, or an intermediate team with player who can be counted a dependable field goal kicker. And consequently many, many opportunities to gather in three points when inside an opponent's twenty-five line are lost.

The best place and drop kick Kingston ever had was "Chick" McRae, who played with Queen's in the early nineties. He could put the ball between the bars from any angle. "Chick" was also a great drop-kicker, and much of Queen's scoring was due to his wonderful kicking at the goal posts. "Billy" Hamilton was another good place kicker. Of late, accurate kicking in Kingston teams has been poor.

FAR WEST ATHLETES COMING TO COMPETE IN INTERCOLLEGIATES
Word has been received that the University of Manitoba will enter a track team in the intercollegiate track meet at Toronto. This has caused much comment and a good deal of surprise in athletic circles. Manitoba University, although small, when compared to the eastern universities, has progressed rapidly in the last few years. A track meet was recently held in Saskatoon. In this meet there were men representing the Universities of Alberta, Manitoba and Saskatchewan. The track representatives from Manitoba won a decisive victory by securing ninety-two out of a possible hundred and twenty-six points.

Carpentier Really Classy
The veteran ex-boxer and present Referee Jack Skelly, of Yonkers, did not see anything fluky about the Carpentier-Levinsky battle, but he did see a remarkable boxer in Carpentier, and in commenting upon his performance, said: "Georges Carpentier's American fighting debut made a great impression on every one who saw him outclass, outbox and outfight Battling Levinsky in Jersey City. "He appeared to me like one of the old school with his speed, brainy tactics and hard hitting with both hands. He's not only a gruelling fighter, but the greatest boxer in his class since Corbett was the big champion. "The Frenchman seemed to confuse Levinsky from the first tap of the gong, and got his goat completely. Maybe it was Georges' hypnotic eye or his manager's mystic influence over the Battler, for the latter seemed to be all at sea and muddled from the start. "Carpentier is certainly a really classy fighter and he's apt to make it very hot and fast for Jack Dempsey if they ever come together."

Fishing Schooners to Race.
A 20-mile breeze will not scare off the fishing schooners Esperanto, of Gloucester and Delawanna, of Halifax best two out of three, the course being 40 miles, triangular. These sturdy craft are now being overhauled. Esperanto is owned by Benjamin A. Smith, of Gloucester, president of a fisheries company. Concerning him the Boston Globe says: "Ben Smith is known by all the older yachtsmen of Massachusetts bay and was very active in the circuit racing of Gloucester fishermen. The family traditions are now kept up by his son, Russel R., and his daughter, Priscilla, who for the last few years have been active in the racing of the Annisquam Yacht club. "The schooners are a little over 100 feet in length and are of about 90 tons burden. The 40-mile course must be covered within nine hours or it will be 'no race.'"

Heydler Hopes for Peace.
Hope for peace in place of the threatened baseball war was expressed in New York by John A. Heydler, president of the National league, and leader of the forces seeking the abolishment of the national commission. "Details of the twelve-team league have not been worked out," he said. "We consider it premature, as we are confident that the five American league clubs will join us. However, if it becomes necessary to organize a twelve-team league it will work in a season or two." It was reported here that Baltimore was getting ready to make a formal application to the National league officials for a franchise in the proposed new league. MONTREAL IS EAGER TO HELP WITH THE REVIVAL

Determination to give Montreal and Canada, as a whole, better representation in track and field competition at the Olympic games, was voiced at a meeting held by representatives of Montreal athletic organizations. Steps were taken to launch a provincial and nation-wide movement to encourage development of athletes to successfully compete with those of other countries.

A committee of officers of the different clubs in the city was elected, which will take up the question of preliminary preparations, and make a report to the next meeting to be held shortly. The suggestion that provincial and dominion government should be interested in the question was not taken up at the meeting.

U. S. Girl Hockeyists Abroad.
The Philadelphia girls' field hockey team, under the management of Miss Gertrude Hearn, and led by Miss Elizabeth Cheston, departed yesterday for England aboard the liner Caronia from New York. The team will play a series of six games, scheduled for the fall of 1914, but which were called off on account of the war. The girls also will play in Scotland and Ireland at the completion of their series in England. Field hockey and lacrosse are popular sports at girls' educational institutions in Great Britain.

Boxing a Major Sport.
Boxing will become a major sport in U.S. collegiate athletics this winter as a result of the organization of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. Nine eastern universities were represented. A tentative draft of rules drawn by Major M. J. Pickering, of the University of Pennsylvania, was adopted. The rules will be presented for the approval of the National Collegiate Athletic Association when it meets here in December. A list of referees and officials was also drawn.

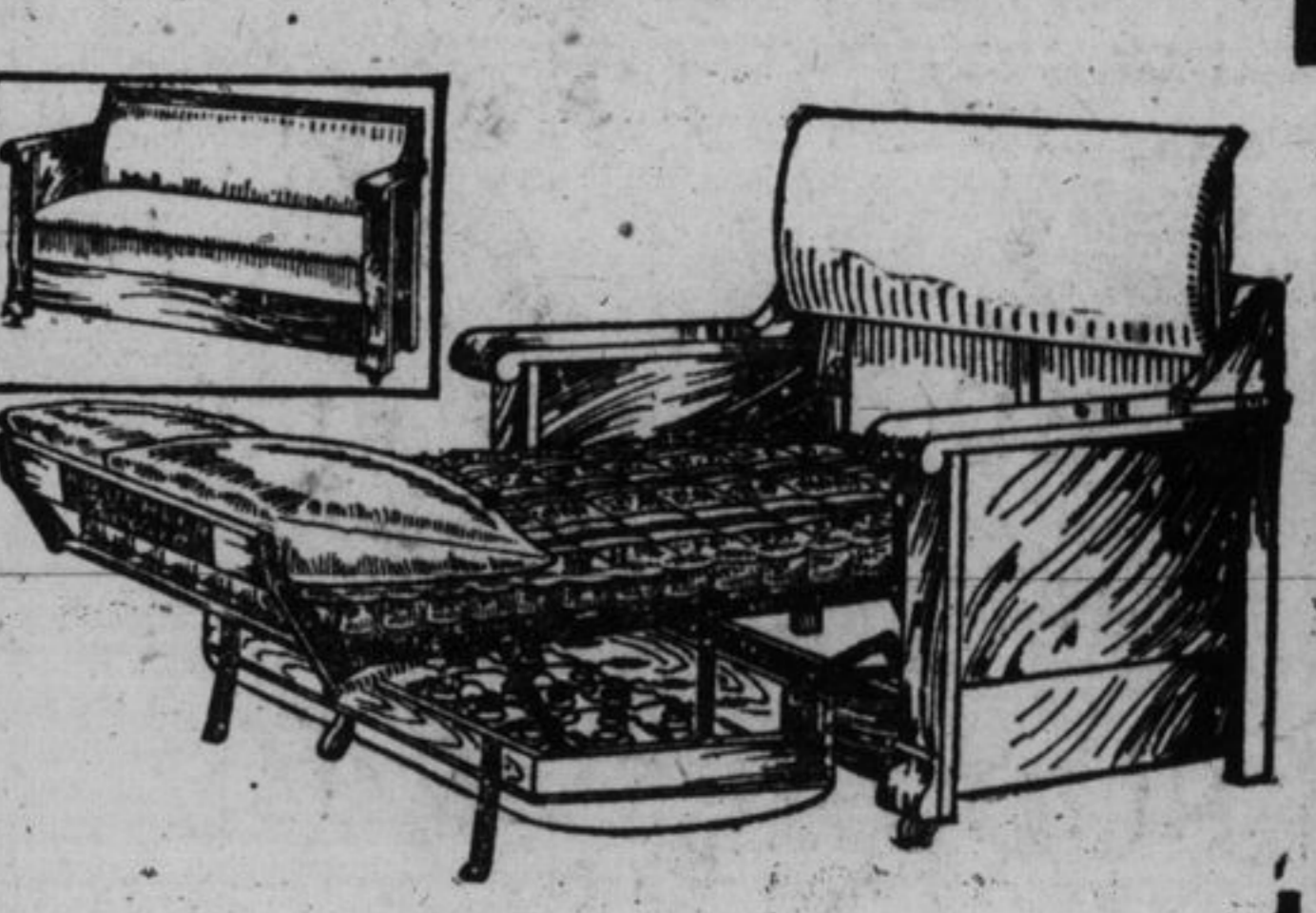
