Not Army and Navy Adjunct.
689 Princess St., Kingston, Oct. 27.—(To the Editor): On Oct. 26th a report of the Army and Navy Veterans' meeting of Oct. 25th was published. The following extract from that report states:
"The Kingston unit of the Army and Navy Veterans is known to all from coast to coast, and with its various features, including its Navy League Branch and Boys' Naval Brigade, along such broad lines of usefulness and influence, going far beyond what was originally considered to be the work of a veterans' organization."
As a member of the Kingston branch of the Navy League of Canada, I beg to take strong exception to this statement, and do not understand why such a misleading article should be given to the public, especially at the present moment when so much unfavorable criticism is being directed against the local branch of the Boys' Naval Brigade.
The local branch (No. 122) of the Navy League and Boys' Naval Brigade is a distinct organization and in no way connected with the Army and Navy Veterans; furthermore the Army and Navy Veterans have no jurisdiction whatever in the working of the Navy League of Canada, or of the Boys' Naval Brigade.
Unfortunately Branch 122 of the Navy League had to rent a portion of the upper flat of the Army and Navy block, because at that time they were the only available quarters they could obtain. In connection with the interest of the Army and Navy Veterans to the Boys' Naval Brigade, I would like to draw attention to the significant fact that they (the A. & N.V.) receive \$100 per month for the new rooms occupied by the Naval Brigade, and I am led to believe that this is far in excess of the amount they pay for rent and taxes for the entire building. Can you wonder they are interested in the Naval Brigade?
Trusting you will publish this letter in the interest of the Naval Brigade, and the Navy League of Canada, so that some of the wrong impressions, which are in the minds of the general public, may be removed.

Over Shortage of Power for the Village Grist Mill.
Another resident of this village has passed away in the person of John Ballard, at over seventy years of age. Death came on Saturday afternoon, after an illness of some time. Deceased removed here from Hastings county about eight years ago, and since that time had always resided here. On Tuesday morning the funeral service was held in St. Paul's Anglican church, with the rector, Rev. F. G. Kirkpatrick, officiating. There is left to survive him his wife, one daughter, Mrs. George Davy, and a son.
Mrs. Haynes and daughter, Toronto, are spending a short time at the home of the former's father, W. Griffith. A number from here attended the lecture in Kingston last Sunday afternoon given by Dr. Wilfred Grenfell.
At the meeting in the township hall, on Tuesday evening, of the United Farmers' Association and the residents of the village, to discuss the question of lighting and power for the grist mill, nothing very definite was decided. For the past week the place has been without electric lights on account of the lowness of the water, and the power plant has not been operating. The farmers are compelled to take their grain some distance in order to get it ground. W. Conway, president of the United Farmers, occupied the chair. Various residents stated their views, and all thought that with care and economy the plant could obtain power enough for its operation most of the year. H. W. Newman, Kingston, and Edward Barker, representing the Power and Light Company, were present, and submitted their case, saying that the power plant and all the accessories necessary to provide light would be turned over to anyone paying \$5,500. It was proposed that the United Farmers purchase the estate, including the mill, dwelling house, and waterway, from Mrs. Woodruff, thereby providing power for the grist mill and the lights, but it was not carried. There is a rumor that some private individual may take up the proposition, but as yet there is no prospect of the difficulty being settled.
Mrs. J. Foxton has recently been appointed as the librarian of the public library, and is now carrying out her duties. Rev. G. Stafford and H. A. Buck are attending the provincial Sunday school convention at Belleville. Frank Trousdale arrived home Tuesday evening, after an absence of a few weeks.
