VALUED AT \$15.50

Tenant Collects From the Landlord in Form of Rent Rebate.

DEFEND THE PASSING OF SUGAR ORDER

Commerce Board Thought Refiners Had Claim in Equity.

Ottawa, Oct. 28.—The letters of resignation of the members of the Board of Commerce, together with the order-in-Council, accepting those resignations and providing that no further appointments should be made pending the result of the appeal now before the judicial committee of the Privy Council, were made public on Tuesday. In his letter of resignation, Captain William White, the chief commissioner, declared that, in passing the sugar order, the board merely implemented the undertaking of the former commissioners. In view of the present price conditions he expressed serious doubts as to the ability of the Board of Commerce to fulfil any useful purpose in the future.

F. A. Ackland in his letter of resignation, accepts his full share of responsibility for the action taken, while Major G. A. Dillon, the third member of the Board, expresses himself as being in agreement with his colleagues of the Board.
