It is alleged that the accused made certain statements about the matter before the Indian council, which caused the charge to be preferred against him.

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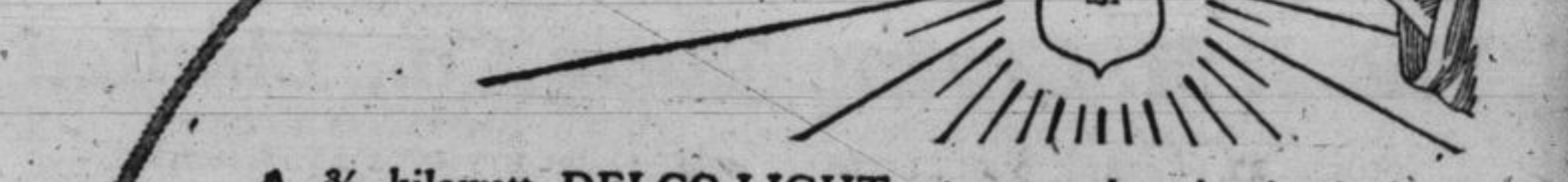


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
