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INSTALLATION AT QUEEN'S INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

Of Prof. McFadyen to Chair of New Testament Literature.
 The installation of Prof. McFadyen to the chair of New Testament Language and Literature in Queen's Theological College, by the Kingston Presbytery, took place on Monday night in convocation hall, in connection with the twenty-ninth annual conference of the Theological Alumni Association. Rev. A. J. Wilson, Napanee, moderator of the Kingston presbytery, presided, and there was a fairly large attendance. In addition to the moderator, there were present on the platform, Principal Taylor, Bishop Bidwell, Rev. W. T. Wilkins, clerk of the Kingston presbytery, G. M. Macdonald, Prof. John Watson, Prof. W. G. Jordan, Rev. Dr. B. M. Gordon, Rev. George Mackinnon, Lachine, Quebec, president of the Theological Alumni Association; Prof. H. T. Wallace, Prof. W. Morgan, Rev. Dr. Dyde, principal of Queen's Theological College, and Prof. McFadyen. Prayer was offered by Prof. Morgan and Principal Taylor, and Prof. Jordan read the scripture lesson. Rev. A. J. Wilson conducted the induction ceremony, the clerk of the Kingston presbytery, Rev. W. T. Wilkins, reading the authorization for the induction from the minutes of the General Assembly. The General Assembly, moderator of the General Assembly, was to have delivered the charge to Prof. McFadyen, but on account of illness, was unable to be present, and the charge was delivered by Rev. Dr. Gordon. The latter, in his address, extended a warm welcome to the new professor, and took occasion to refer to the fact that Prof. McFadyen was taking the chair vacated by Prof. Ernest Scott who had filled the position with distinction.
 "We welcome you on account of the important task in connection with which you have come to us," said Dr. Gordon, "that of training men in the ministry of the Word—the Word which still, as of old, make men wise unto salvation. No department in the college is of greater importance than that in which you will serve."
 Dr. Gordon remarked that Prof. McFadyen came to the college with experience in teaching and preaching in India.
 "I welcome you to your task," said Dr. Gordon, "and trust that you may not only find joy in your work, but that there may go forth from these halls, that are now enriched with so many hallowed memories, men who will prove themselves to be wisely instructed in the things of the Kingdom, to the praise and glory of the great head of the church."
 Prof. McFadyen delivered a brilliant address, taking occasion to extend sincere thanks for the warm reception extended to him by Dr. Dyde, Principal Taylor, members of the staff, the presbytery, and many friends. Although he had been here less than two months, he felt that he was not by any means a stranger in a foreign country, so warm had his welcome been made. He regarded it as a very high honor, indeed, to be selected to fill a chair in such a distinguished college as Queen's.
 Prof. McFadyen gave his address over to the question of missions and the study of the New Testament, and was listened to with keen interest throughout. He referred at some length to some phases of his work in India. The New Testament, he pointed out, was a missionary book. A person engaged on the mission field derived the meaning of the New Testament which brought them near to the people who saw Jesus, witnessed his death and his resurrection. The new testament presented some hard thinking and deep theology. The service closed with the benediction pronounced by Dr. Dyde.
 At the theological convocation on Monday afternoon, Prof. McFadyen, of Queen's University, spoke on the subject, "Religious Toleration—An Historical Sketch."
 On Tuesday morning, the programme included an address on "Apollo, Thor Jehovah," by Rev. M. Leckie, Kirkwall; an address on "David," by Rev. A. J. Wilson, Napanee, and an address by Canon W. F. Fitzgerald on "The Bible in Education" with a discussion led by Rev. J. S. La Flair and Rev. W. T. G. Brown.
 The conference will continue Wednesday and Thursday, with morning, afternoon and evening sessions, and a morning session on Friday. Delegates are taking lunch and tea together each day, at Queen's cafeteria at 1.15 and 6.15 p.m.
