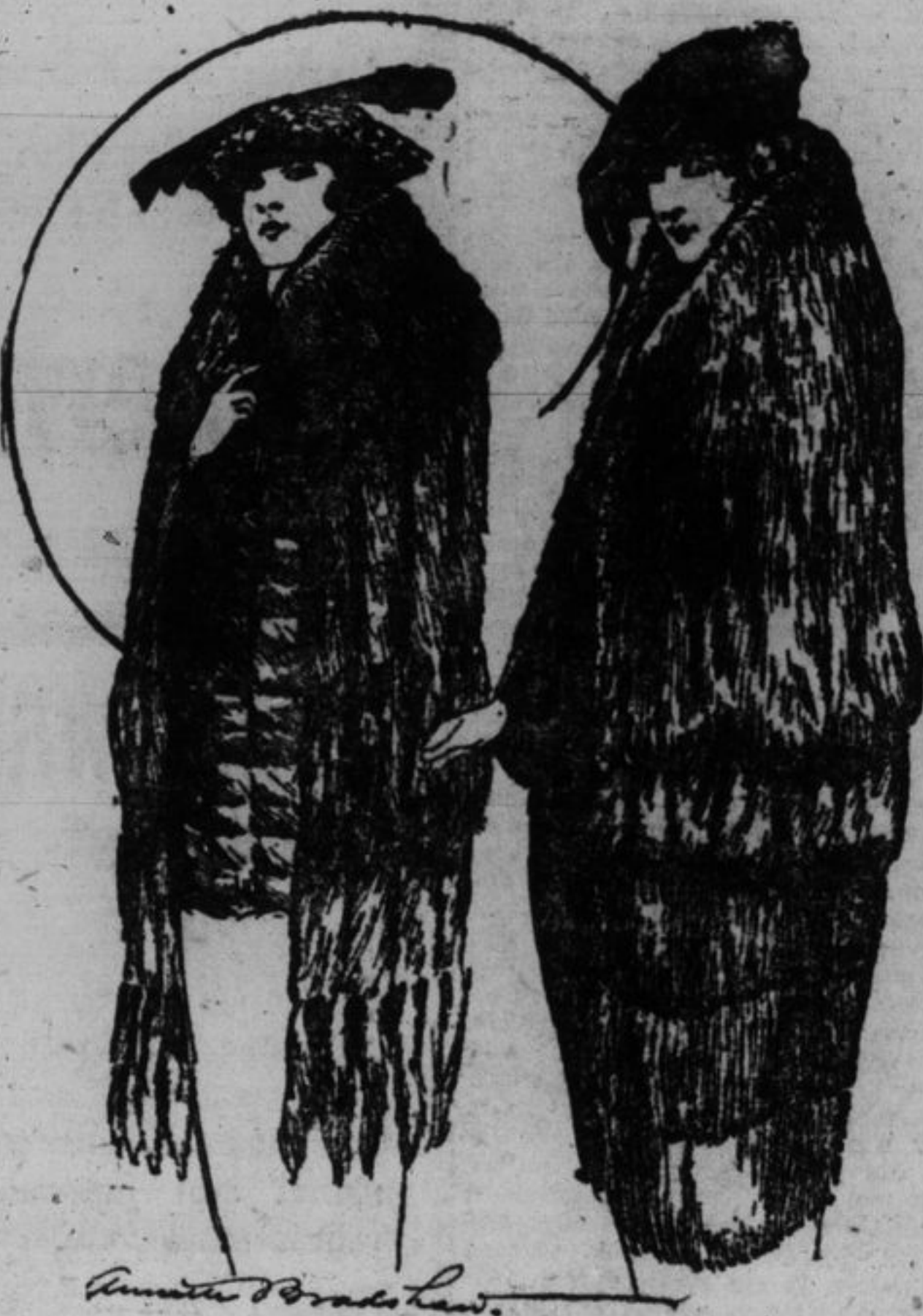

TWO FUR COATS OF CHARMING FASHION

Gray Squirrel Favored by Young and Old With Linings Plain.

Fur wraps are new-appearing in many delightful styles. There are long, straight coats with high choker collars, exquisite capes that have no sleeves, but merely apertures for the arms. On many, the pelts are arranged in most decorative style—panels and bands being cleverly suggested by their novel placing.

The favored linings are mostly plain satins, while the absence of fastenings is very noticeable on some of the smartest wraps.

Gray squirrel is much liked, both by the young girl and the woman of mature years. This is the fur used in the model at the right. It is designed with a very deep collar that is finished with a slightly gathered flounce of the fur. Beneath this point, three

bands of squirrel are effectively arranged.

The hat, which favors the soft lines of the tam, is modelled from blue velvet and trimmed with pheasant feathers.

The other wrap is originated in koltany. The wide collar overlaps a smart vest of the fur, which is arranged in horizontal pieces. This extends only part way down the front. The sides and back are decidedly longer, and are elaborated with tails. The pelts are disposed so that each one is set separately on the lining of brown satin.

The hat of brown satin, elaborated with tiny knots of ribbon, has a facing of brown velvet, and boasts a dashing, pasted feather trimmings.

KITCHEN ECONOMIES

Six Ways to Serve Game Deliciously.
If there is an unexpected influx of game into the local market, why not use it as an occasional delicacy? Grouse and quail and partridge are no longer as abundant as they were, but there is occasionally a quantity of less rare game—such as venison and rabbit and other feathered delicacies.

Roast Quail.

Draw and wipe carefully with a soft, damp cloth. Stuff raw oysters inside, and fasten together as a stuffed chicken. Place thin slices of fat bacon over the breast, place in roasting pan with a very little hot water, and cook in a hot oven for twenty minutes. Baste frequently with butter and hot water. Dust with salt and pepper before serving.

Pigeon Pie.

Clean and wipe pigeons with damp cloth. Lightly fry a small sliced onion, and saute the birds until light brown. Butter a baking dish, place the birds in it with a little salt pork, chopped hard-boiled eggs and chopped livers. Dredge flour over all, and pour over water and seasoning. Cover with a thick pie-crust, and bake in a moderate oven for one hour.

Broiled Squab.

Split the squabs down the back, rub with butter, sprinkle with salt and pepper, and broil over the red coals or under a hot gas flame. Serve on hot, well-buttered toast slightly moistened.

Stewed Rabbit.

Heat one tablespoonful of butter in a large saucepan and fry a thinly sliced onion in it. Place the cleaned, skinned joints of rabbit in it, salt, pepper and dredge with flour, and saute the rabbit quickly over a hot fire for five minutes turning it frequently that all parts may be seared. Cover rabbit with cold water, season with parsley, sweet marjoram, pepper and salt, and stew until tender. Remove the meat and pile on a hot dish. Rub a teaspoon-

ful of butter and flour together, mix with the gravy, and cook with one teaspoonful of Worcestershire sauce. Boil for two minutes, then remove from the fire and serve with the meat.

Venison Steak.

Try to get a steak cut from the loin, as this is especially tender, and much like mutton chops in shape. Broil over a very clear fire, turning frequently and cooking longer than beef. When tender, season with salt and pepper and spread with butter. Serve hot with some tart jelly.

Roast Canvasback Duck.

Draw and singe the duck and wipe inside and out with a damp cloth. Salt, pepper and rub the inside with a mixture of salad oil and lemon juice. Stuff with cranberries or currant jelly, and place in the covered roaster. Have a half-cupful of boiling water underneath the duck, and cook for 30 minutes, basting about three times. Remove from roaster spread with butter and lemon juice, and leave uncovered to brown.

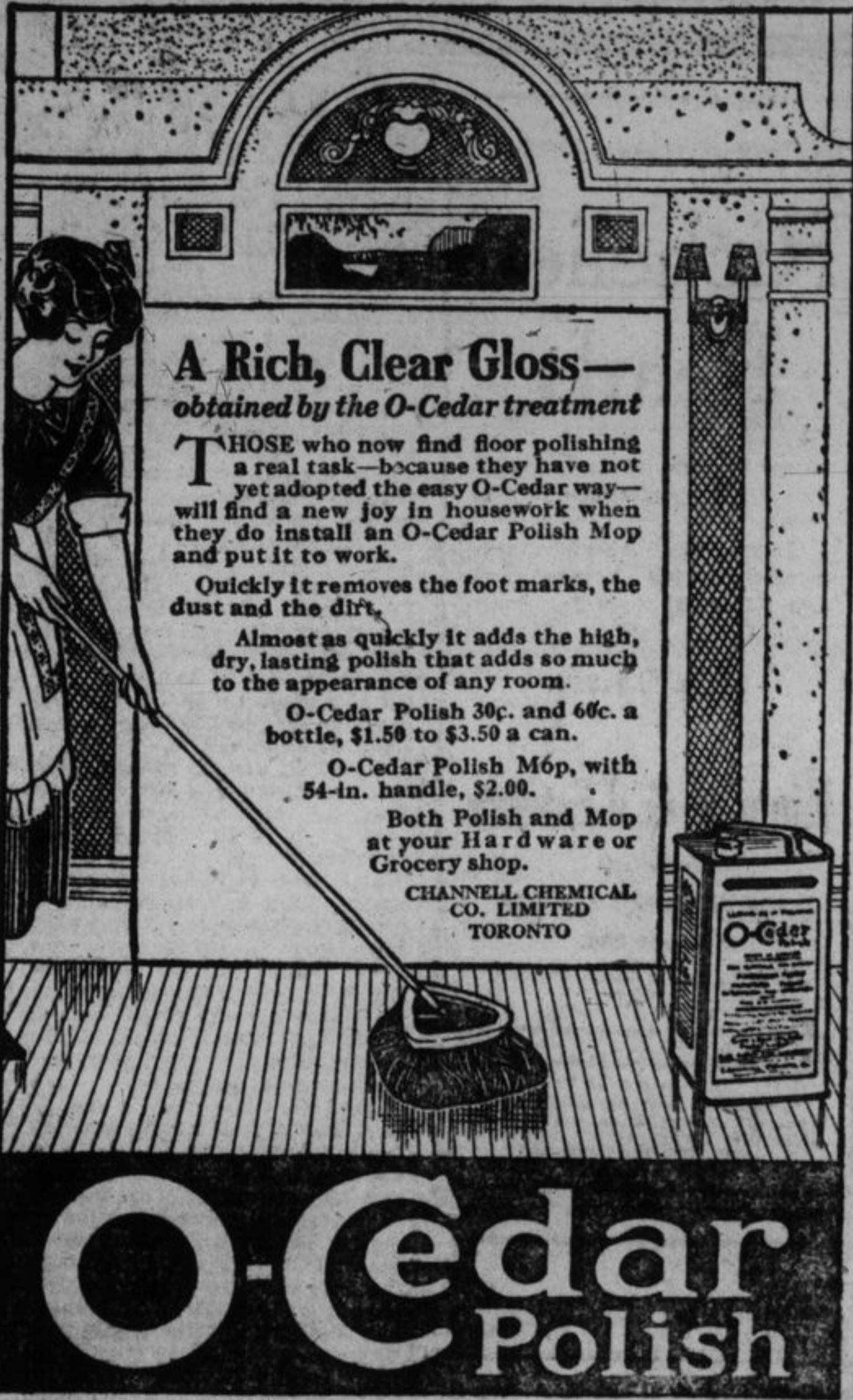
