## R.M.C. DEFEATS QUEEN'S, 13-11

After a hard fought battle, the junior R.M.C. team eliminated from the series, Queen's III at the athletic grounds on Saturday afternoon. Both teams struggled for the victory for all that was in them, and there was not much to choose between them. The R.M.C. punter was superior to McNeill, however, and this was a deciding factor in the game. McNeill kicked well but he is too short to boot the leather as his opponent did. Dolan and McCartney were the outstanding stars for Queen's, with Hewgill following close with his smashing kicks.

Few teams in Canadian rugby today can surpass the cadet seniors on passing the ball, and the juniors have also mastered this feature of the game. On several occasions on Saturday, their passing and covering work saved them from defeat and made gains for them. Their wings were fine on the tackling, and were well up on all the long punts, waiting patiently to nab McNeill or Hatcherford after the catch.

In the first quarter, R.M.C. were hard pushed to keep up to the tricolor, who drew first blood a short time after play started, with a field goal, kicked with fine judgement by McNeill. The cadets recovered, however, and working the ball up the field with a quick succession of short end runs and onside kicks, carried over a try on a fake buck formation. It was not converted.

Almost immediately after the beginning of the second period they repeated the performance, and again were unsuccessful on the conversion. Queen's then settled down and kept the ball well in the cadets' territory, securing two rouges from McNeill's kicks. The halftime score stood, R.M.C., 10; Queen's, 5.

In the third quarter, R.M.C. again had the advantage of the wind and used it to its fullest extent, kicking almost every time they secured the ball. The long punts were bound to have some effect and they secured two rouges before changing ends one more. Even with the wind against them, they kicked their way up the field for another point. Queen's with visions of the trip to Toronto next Saturday, settled down to win and worked the ball right up to the cadets' goal line, finally shoving it over for a try.
