## DEATH OF W. J. MAGRATH.

Former Belleville Cheese Dealer Dies in Edmonton.  
Belleville, Nov. 10.—W. J. Magrath, formerly of this city, died Sunday at his home in Edmonton. He took very ill a couple of years ago but survived the attack and recuperated his health sufficiently at the Clifton Sanitarium, N.Y., to be about for the past few months.
