The members of the Church of God, Wellington, raised \$95 for their thanksgiving. This is being sent to support a girls' shelter in Calcutta, India. It is reported that conversions are taking place at this church.

To Live at Brussels.
J. Stuart Bleakney, formerly trade commissioner at Rotterdam, will be stationed at Brussels, with jurisdiction in Belgium, and Mr. Shortt will take over the work in Holland. Mr. Bleakney is a son-in-law of Inspector J. Russell Stuart, Kingston.

Queen's and Ireland.

Fire Destroys Graphite Warehouse.
The large warehouse and packing-room at Calabogie, belonging to the Black Donald Mine Co., has been destroyed by fire of mysterious origin. A bucket brigade saved the surrounding buildings. The warehouse was filled with refined graphite ready for shipment, some of it worth \$1 a pound.

Bootlegger Sentenced.
At Cornwall on Nov. 9th, the provincial officers summoned Achille Duchesne before Deputy Police Magistrate Cline on a charge of selling intoxicating liquor. He pleaded guilty and was sent to jail for thirty days and must pay a fine of \$500 within five days or remain in custody for an additional two months.

Returned Veteran Purchased Farm.
At Bishop's Mills another real estate deal was concluded this week when Charles Poole sold his farm, through the Soldiers' Settlement Board, to Henry Desdo, formerly of Arrprior. The latter served two years overseas in the Forestry Corps, and rented Joseph Cullen's farm during the past season.

Death of Jack Nolan.
Jack Nolan, once a well known Dublin Nationalist figure, has just died there. In 1900 he was arrested in Canada, with two others, on a charge of attempting to blow up the lock on the Welland Canal and was sentenced to penal servitude for life. After serving sixteen years of his sentence he was released and later he returned to Ireland.

Rothwell-Thomas Wedding.
In St. John's church, Smith's Falls, on Nov. 6th, Archdeacon Bliss united in marriage Viola Elena, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Thomas, Smith's Falls, and Edward Fulton Rothwell, son of the late Samuel G. Rothwell, Brockville. The bridegroom went overseas with the 21st Battalion in 1914 and was twice wounded while serving in France with that unit.

Tribute to Late A. J. Macdonnell.
At the dinner held by the Kingston Canadian Club on Thursday night, Prof. W. G. Jordan, the president, made feeling reference to the death of Angus J. Macdonnell, who for many years was an active member of the club, and who served for several years as treasurer. He rarely missed a meeting of the club, took a keen interest in all its activities, and will be much missed by the members.

Farmers' Candidate Picked.
The four U. F. O. Clubs in McNab township have fixed upon a Farmer-Labor candidate for the Dominion parliament. He is A. J. Johnston, Grand Trunk agent at Glasgow, who was raised a farmer and has been active in U. F. O. movements since its inception. His claim to the support of organized labor is the fact that he has been for eight years a member of the Telegraphers' Union.

Confirmation Services.
The Bishop of Ontario visited Roslin parish on the 8th inst., to administer the sacred and apostolic rite of confirmation. Rev. Mr. Davies, who has been doing earnest and faithful work, presented a goodly class of candidates to the bishop, who addressed them most solemnly and impressively before laying on of hands. His lordship also officially inducted the Rev. Mr. Davies as rector of the parish.

Married at Deseronto.
At the home of the bride in Deseronto, Adam Scott, Forest Mills, was married to Mrs. Ida Storrings, Deseronto. Only a few of the immediate friends of the contracting parties were present at the ceremony performed by Rev. R. Bamforth, B.A., pastor of Deseronto Methodist church. The bride was becomingly

gowned in taupe tulle. Her going away gown was navy tricolette with hat to match. The happy couple left for Toronto and Niagara Falls.

Secured the Whig Prize.
George Leatherland, inventory salesman for Latimer cheese factory, was the winner of the Daily British Whig's special prize for the best dairy herd at the inventory fair. The prize was one year's subscription to the Whig and Mr. Leatherland received congratulations when he called at the office today. He is one of Inventory's prominent farmers and has been eminently successful as salesman for his factory, being a regular attendant at the Frontenac Cheese Board where he is regarded as a man of the highest integrity in all his business dealings.

Wonderful Piece of Handicraft.
One of the most wonderful pieces of handicraft ever seen in this city is displayed in the window of the College Book Store. It is a doll's house and garden; the dimensions of the garden being 32 x 50 inches and the dimensions of the house 36 x 54. It is a two story building showing the dining room and kitchen on the first floor and billiard and play room on the second floor. For outside decoration are shown the lawn with an automobile with approaching visitors in the foreground, electric light lamp posts and potted flowers, balconies equipped with out door furniture and canopied awnings. The cottage will be drawn for at the St. Mary's at the Lake bazaar next week.

The First Bishop.
It is interesting to recall the fact that the first Roman Catholic Bishop of the part of the province of Upper Canada that included Glengarry was the famous Alexander Macdonell, a native of Glengarry in Scotland. Moved with compassion for the evicted Highland people of that locality, he emigrated to Canada with the members of a Glengarry regiment that had been disbanded in 1803. A grant of 160,000 acres made to them became part of Glengarry county, on the bank of the St. Lawrence River, and Father Macdonell was appointed Bishop, in 1820, of the whole district, with his headquarters at Kingston. While engaged in trying to raise funds in Britain to equip Regiopolis College, at Kingston, he died at Dumfries, in Scotland, in 1840.
