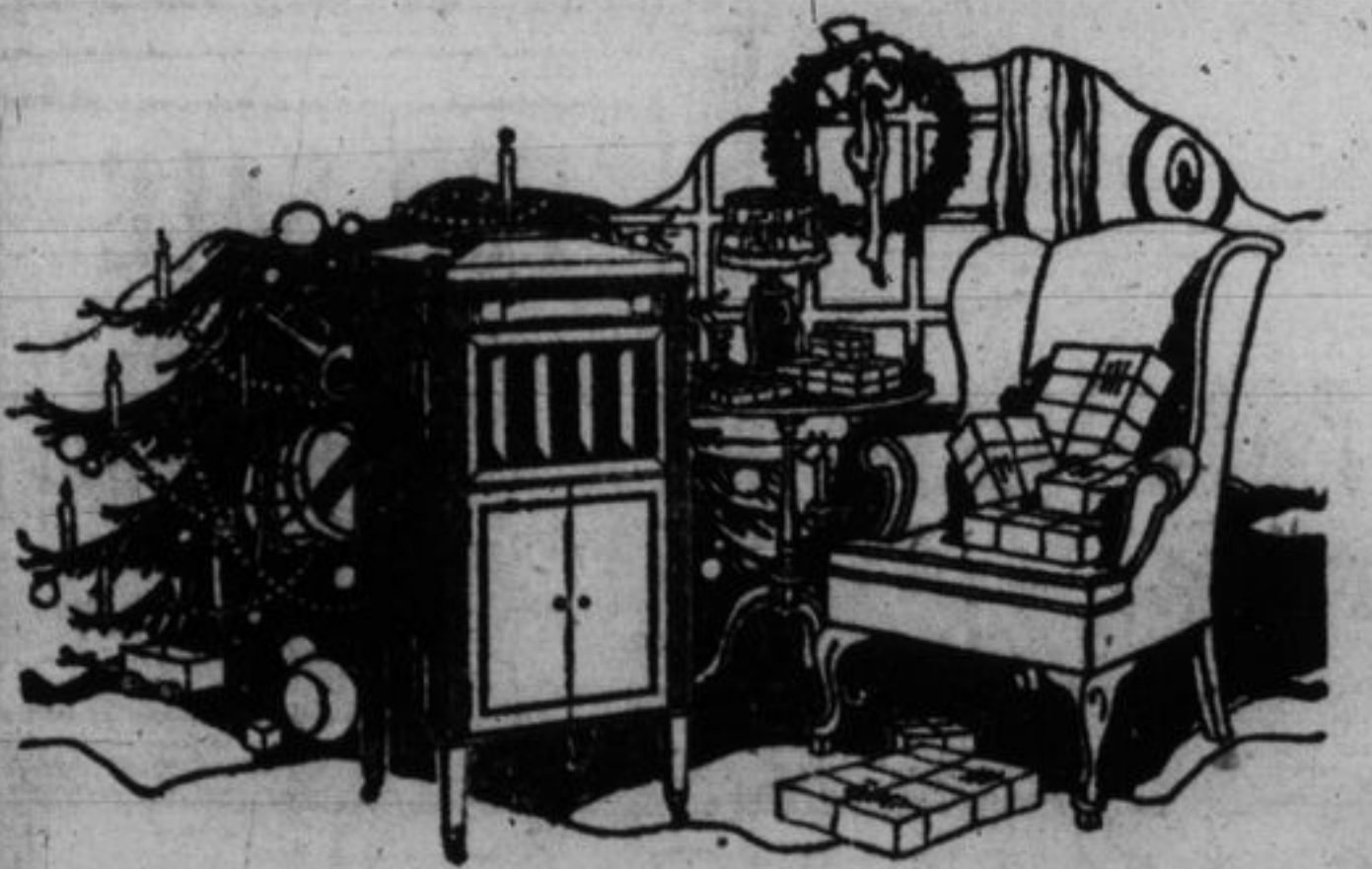
Bright for Varsity. The Toronto Telegram says: Things certainly look bright for Varsity. They look brighter than at any time this season.

BOY WINS POT O' GOLD. Reaches His Rainbow's End When Judge Says "Finder's Keeper." Newcastle, Ind., Nov. 18.—Ownership of \$1,300 in gold found buried in a farm near Greensboro six months ago by Levi Todd, a fifteen-year-old boy, was settled yesterday in the Circuit Court here, Judge Cass deciding that "finders are keepers."

under an old house young Todd drove his pick into an earthenware jar containing the money, and then started a three-cornered fight for its ownership. Mrs. Clara Freeman Vickery, of this city, claimed the money was part of her mother's estate, and John Hardin, present owner of the farm, sought an interest as owner of the land. The Judge gave the money to the youthful finder, holding the evidence was insufficient to show Mrs. Vickery's mother had buried it, and that Mr. Hardin's ownership of the land did not give him ownership of the money because he was ignorant of its existence.

Three Years in Prison. Toronto, Nov. 18.—George Simpkins was sentenced to three years in Portsmouth penitentiary by Judge Coatsworth in the sessions on five charges of theft from the Dominion Automobile Co., George H. Hess &

Co., Gordon McKay & Co., Murray-Kay, Co., and McDonald and Willison. The thefts, the crown said, were over a period of three years, and when accused's house was searched goods valued at \$3,000 were found.
