GERMAN EMPRESS SERIOUSLY ILL She Has Had Severe Heart Attacks—The Family Has Been Summoned.



THE GERMAN EMPRESS Doorn, Holland, Nov. 19.—Former Empress Augusta Victoria of Germany, who yesterday suffered another severe heart attack, appeared late last night to be in a more serious condition than the officials at Doorn Castle would admit. All her sons and daughters were notified of her illness and are expected to-day. Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of the former emperor, may also arrive to-day. Greatest depression prevails at Doorn Castle. Dr. Heymans Vandenberg, heart specialist, examined the former empress yesterday and found her condition dangerous. She may, however, linger for many weeks. A bulletin issued at Doorn Castle this morning, stated the former empress had passed a good night and that her temperature was 38 degrees centigrade (100.4 Fahrenheit).

THE WESTERN WOMEN KEEN IN POLITICS

Their Presence at Meetings Regarded as Hopeful Sign of the Times.

En Route With Prime Minister, Nov. 19.—"It will not take long to annihilate the mass of misrepresentation that men with nothing better to do have been scattering abroad for years." This is the pitiful impression of the prime minister as expressed at the conclusion of the western tour. He has spoken to well over one hundred thousand people at these meetings, and has been impressed with the obvious desire on the part of the electors to learn the facts regarding the government's policy as well as their wish to understand what has been occurring in the last three years. In the big cities, like Winnipeg, Vancouver, Calgary and Regina, the audiences have been representative of every class in the community, while in the smaller cities on the prairies and in the agricultural districts people have driven in scores of miles in order to listen to his addresses. To Calgary belongs the honor of providing the largest audience. The attendants of the women voters at the meetings has been most prominent and the close interest with which they followed the arguments of the speakers is regarded by competent observers as one of the most hopeful signs of the times. The fact that men prominent for years in Liberal and Unionist circles have thrown in their lot with the National Party has had a great deal to do with the success of the tour, for they are men who have been looked upon as of the new thought.

AGAINST PROHIBITION.

Wet Majority in British Columbia Was 34,947. Vancouver, B.C., Nov. 19.—Government control has a majority of 34,947 over prohibition in the whole of British Columbia, with the exception of Atlin district, according to final returns from the plebiscite vote of October 26th, made public by the official government returning officer today. The totals are: Government control, 59,688; prohibition, 54,741. There were 1,637 rejected ballots. Out of a total of 206,892 registered voters in the province, 146,956 voted on the liquor plebiscite. Only two districts out of 39 voted dry. The final returns from Atlin, where there are 1,640 votes, are not in.

LIEUT.-COL. MALONE GOES TO PRISON
London, Nov. 19.—Lieut.-Col. L'Estrange Malone, Liberal Member of the House of Commons, who was arrested in Dublin on Nov. 19th for alleged seditious utterances, was today sentenced to six months' imprisonment.

PROTESTS AGAINST ASSESSMENT ROLL

Renfrew Ex-Mayor Claims it Shows Incompetency and is Unjust.

Renfrew, Nov. 19.—A protest against the entire assessment roll, just completed, has been filed with Town Clerk Devenny by Dr. N. McCormack, ex-Mayor.

The doctor alleges that the assessment shows forth incompetency and injustice, that real estate and buildings have as often been assessed far above as below value. In the case of his own property, he charges that he has been assessed too high.

The town employed a new assessor, a returned soldier, this year, he being the only applicant, for the position. If his figures are too high in some cases, the total assessed value of Renfrew has fallen away by several hundred thousand dollars. Some property has been overlooked entirely. Such a situation has never before arisen here.

Lawyers say the action of the ex-Mayor is legal, and that the ratepayers can refuse to pay taxes until the entire matter is righted. The ex-Mayor offers to withdraw his protest if the Town Council will publish the assessment roll, if the assessor will appear before the Assessment Committee and explain his work, or if the Council agrees to bring in an experienced outsider to adjust the assessed values next year.

Town officials says the Assessment Committee, which acts as a Court of Revision, can right any discrepancies in the situation.
