Montreal, Nov. 19 .- Much unemployment exists at present among the nursing profession of Mentreal. The principal cause of this condition, it is said, is the generally good state of the public health, but other reasons are also advanced. One is the increased schedule of the public health, but other reasons are also advanced. creased schedule of charges for attendance which came into effect a few months ago and which, possibly, has the effect of limiting the demand to those cases where nurses are absolutely necessary.
