The Ottawa Citizen of Thursday has the following: "A large number of Ottawa people will go up to Kingston for the McGill-Varsity game Saturday. Wintry weather conditions also prevail at the Limestone City and it will be necessary to clear the gridiron of snow when the big Intercollegiate teams come together. Of course, the weather may modify meantime, but it is doubtful. Local sentiment appears pretty evenly divided. Formerly Ottawa was a strong McGill town, but there is no doubt that the refusal of McGill to play off for the Grey Cup, whereas Varsity has consented to do so, has affected sentiment to some extent. Many, however, are pulling for Varsity to win, chiefly because they wish to see the question of supremacy between the Interprovincial and the Intercollegiate teams settled.

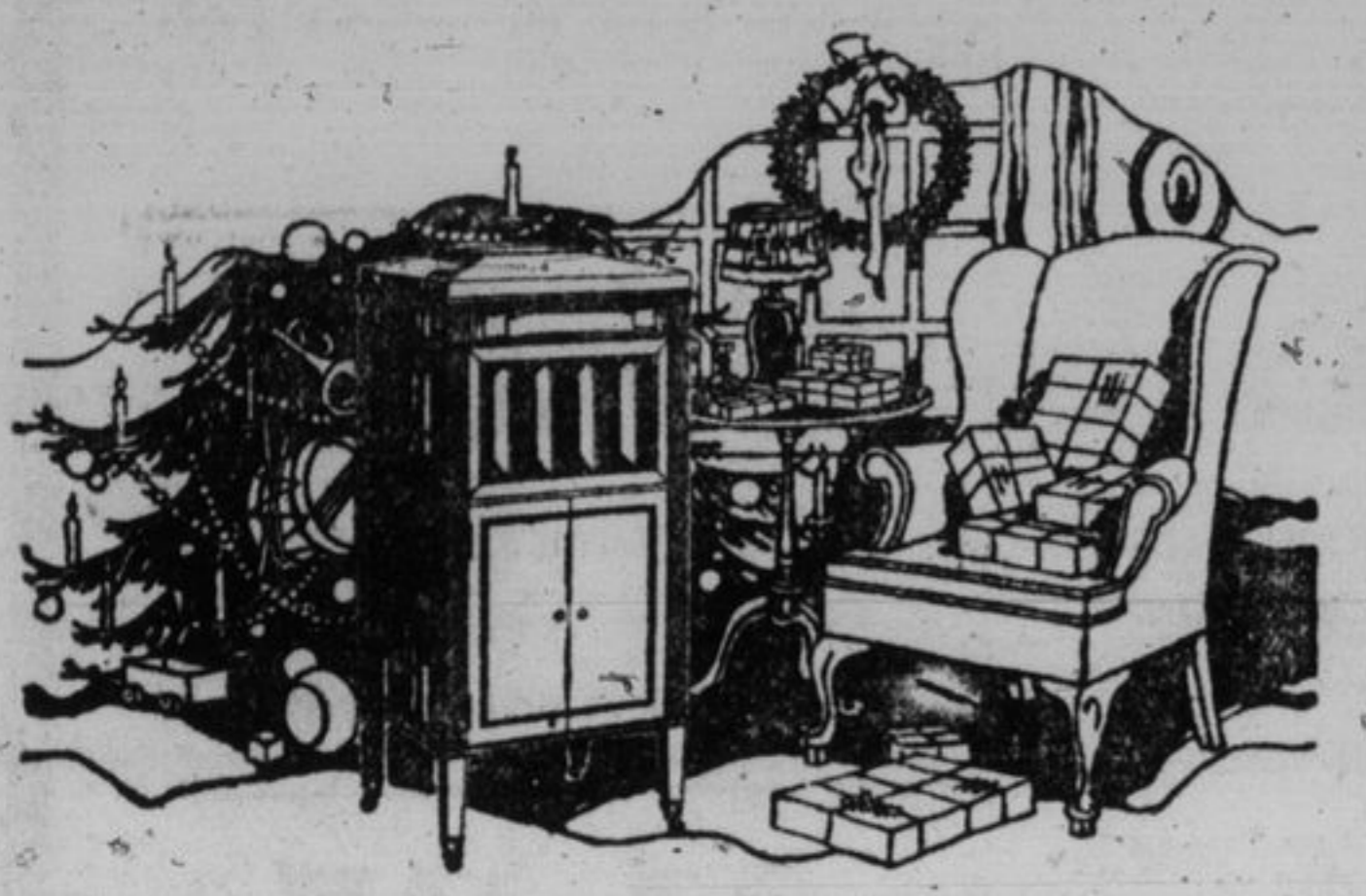
Rugby Sportsmanship.

Toronto Star. McGill and Toronto universities have shown a commendable spirit in their decision to give Queen's University the entire net revenue from the Intercollegiate rugby final. Queen's has not the same opportunity to develop a championship team, but it has made a series possible year after year by participating in the series against almost hopeless odds. And each year the Queen's team has struggled doggedly, if vainly, for the mastery. That is true sportsmanship.

It would have been a shame to have taken the Intercollegiate final to Ottawa or any other point when the home of Queen's is midway between Toronto and Montreal. Kingston will be fair to both teams and applaud any brilliant play.

Rugby fans hope Varsity will win the Intercollegiate championship so that a game may be staged with the winner of the Interprovincial series. But it is not easy to condemn McGill's verdict that a time comes when rugby should give way to studies.


