## World of Sport

### ELEVEN MILLIONS BET ON THE RACES IN QUEBEC THIS YEAR

According to the figures of Provincial Government Inspector Francis H. Dunn, who represented the Quebec Government at all provincial race-tracks the past season, and supervised the pari-mutuel arrangements, a total amount of \$11,714,733 was wagered by the 246,500 people who paid admissions. These figures include the Blue Bonnets, Dorval, Mount Royal and Connaught parks, all milles, and the Delonnie, Matsonneuve and King Edward parks, half-milles.

Dorval did the largest business, with Connaught Park second and Blue Bonnets third. The admission averaged about \$1.25, so that admissions totalled over \$300,000 in the season. The figures have been accepted by the Provincial Government.

### COBB RECOMMENDS PITCHER TO DETROIT

Upon the strongly worded recommendation of Ty Cobb, President of Detroit Tigers, announced that the club had secured Pletcher Cole from the San Francisco club, Pacific Coast league. Cole, according to Ty Cobb, is a "left-hander" with a righthander's brains. He knows how to pitch, has a fast ball, a good curve, and for a southpaw is an exceptional fielder.

Bert Ellison, who has been on the Detroit roster for some time, will be turned over to the San Francisco club by Navin, who, however, will keep a string on the pitcher.

### McNAMARA BROTHERS COACH RIVAL TEAMS

Sudbury fans are eagerly looking forward to the N.O.H.A. senior games between Sault Ste. Marie and Sudbury, not only because the teams are well matched, but also because the McNamara brothers will be the rival coaches. Harold McNamara is tutoring the Soo team, while Howard McNamara will replace "Stan" Burgess as tutor of the N.O.H.A. champions.

### JUDGE LANDIS GETS "FRIENDLY" ADVICE

Judge Landis, Chicago, is not looking up any authorities on the baseball decision he has under advisement.

One friend reminds him that the salary attached to the baseball job will be \$250,000 for the intended tenure of office for seven years. At present, as a federal judge, his total remuneration for the same period is only \$52,000.

### DO NOT LIKE RULES.

Big Four Union Likely to Discard the Present Code.

George A. Church, former Ottawa player, and president of the Ottawa Club, will succeed Bob Webster, of Hamilton, as president of the Big Four. Dr. Smirle Lawson, of Toronto, will be first vice-president, and Percy Roberts, of Montreal, will move up to the position of second vice-president.

The annual meeting takes place on the third Saturday in December. None of the officials of the union will say anything about proposed changes, but it is understood that the clubs are not in favor of the new code, copied from the Intercollegiate Union.

### State of Michigan Introduces Boxing in High Schools

Teaching of boxing in the high schools of Michigan, at state expense, or rather at the expense of the State Boxing Commission, whose money is derived from a percentage of the gate receipts at legalized boxing matches, is the latest offering of the State Athletic Commission. Besides introducing boxing for boys of the high schools of the state, an "instructress" has been engaged to go about the state to direct recreational work particularly among the girls in the grade rural schools.

The boxing instructor engaged is W. J. Masterson, former boxing instructor at Camp Custer, and later at the Detroit Y.M.C.A. and Detroit Recreational Commission. The services of these two will be available on request to the Department of Public Instruction at Lansing, the state capital, without expense.

### Plenty to be Done.

When the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada holds its annual meeting at Winnipeg in December it will be confronted by a heavy order sheet. There are many matters of great importance to the cause of amateurism to be discussed, and they are contentious matters which are apt to precipitate more or less acrimonious debate.

The Western hockey muddle is the result of the relaxation of the amateur rule at the last annual meeting of the Union. There is not yet any unanimity of opinion as to the most desirable course to pursue in the matter.

Efforts will be made to revise the rule which prohibits amateur competition by physical directors and others engaged in sport as a means of livelihood. It is not reasonable to expect that there will be any revision which will result in permitting such individuals to compete. All that can be expected is permission for those who were once engaged in work of the kind, but have since abandoned it, to secure registration cards, provided a more or less lengthy term of years has elapsed since they retired. Even that is a remote prospect. The tendency should be to tighten, rather than to loosen, the amateur rule.

### Sporting Notes.

The annual intercollegiate wrestling championships will be held at Princeton next March.

Benny Coster, the New Orleans bantam, who appeared to be on the down grade a while back, is reported to be going good again.

A re-organization of the Three-I League with a view to shortening the circuit is likely to be made before the opening of next season.

All the prominent yacht clubs on Pensacola have joined in the organization of the Gulf Coast Yachting Association.

Kansas boasts of a preacher-referee in the person of Rev. Earl A. Blackburn, of Chanute, who has appeared as the third man in the ring at numerous boxing contests.

An indoor trapshooting tournament, to include championship events for professionals, amateurs, and women, is to be staged in Madison Square Garden next January.

Saving the Partridge. The shooting of partridges has been under the ban in Ontario for several years, and although the prohibition is to be removed now, the open season is to be greatly limited. This year partridges may be shot in Ontario from November 5th to November 20th, inclusive, but no person is permitted to kill more than five birds on any one day, or more than ten during the whole season.

It was found some years ago that partridges were threatened with extermination in Ontario, and, therefore, a long closed season was introduced.

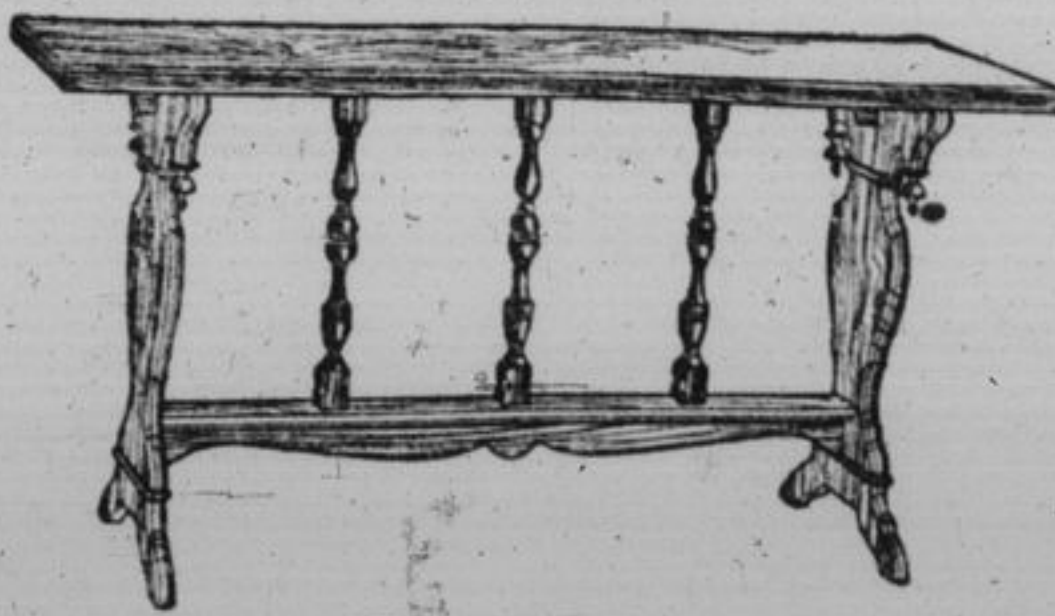
Nothing could justify the disappearance of this fine bird from the province and, indeed, care should be taken to prevent its number becoming again so reduced as they were three years ago.
