

For One Class of Vehicles Actually

One feature of the new motor vehile fees for 1921 is that the license fee on one class of cars under the revised rating is actually reduced \$5. Under the old schedule all passenger cars of 35 horsepower and up to 50 horsepower paid a fee of \$25. Under the new schedule passenger cars

of 35 horsepower and up to 50 horsepower, having four cylinders, will

now pay only \$20. Again, under the old regulations passenger cars over 50 horsepower paid \$30. Under the new schedule no increase of tees has been made of passenger cars of four cylinders and
