> Ottawa, Nov. 29 .- Since the return of the prime minister from his western tour nearly all of his colleagues in the cabinet have returned to the job, and members of parliament are dropping in day by day to consult with the government and talk over the programme for the next session of parliament. Hon J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways, is expected back to-day, and Right Hon. C. J. Doherts and Sir George Foster will return from Geneva by Christ-

It is pretty well understood that the opening of the session which had been planned for January 20th, will postponed until the first or second Thursday in February. This delay is due to the protracted labors of the tariff commission.

It has been definitely decided that the revision of the tariff will be the principal work of the coming session. The redistribution of parliamentary seats will have to go over until 1921 as the results of the decennial census to be taken next June will not be


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
