**THE STUDENTS' PARADE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY**

Takes Place Saturday Night—  
Address by Capt. Henri de Man.

Although experiencing a number of draw-backs, Queen's students are planning for one of the largest and best parades ever held in Kingston, this evening. Everybody is enthusiastic, and even though the idea is new to a large number at the university, all are anxious to participate. Practically every unit in the college will have a float, including Arts, Levana and Theology. The students have found that fireworks were always a feature of the old parades, and have become a luxury, but most of the years are going to the expense of having an abundant supply.

The parade will start at 7.30 p.m. Saturday (postponed to to-night) and follow a route starting at the college, along Union to Barrie street, up Barrie to Princess, down Princess to Wellington, out Wellington to West, to King, to Barrie, up Barrie to Stuart, and then to the college grounds.

A pipe band is to lead the procession, assisted by a band of musicians from the college. It is expected that the ladies will be in vans owing to the condition of the weather and roads.

If permission can be obtained from the university authorities, an informal dance will be held in Great Hall on the return of the paraders.

Playing on a field covered with a couple of inches of sleet, the medical faculty rugby team won from Science by a score of 18-0 in the final fixture in Queen's interfaculty rugby schedule. Medicine won the first game from Arts, and the players have been busy in the order to make the final game possible, by defeating Science, the championship returns to the medical faculty as they were defeated by Science in the finals last year.

The Medicals showed their superiority from the beginning of the game both in the line and in their play. Time and time again the winners stole the ball and made yards, and at no time in the game was the "Meds" margin in danger. The first quarter was scoreless but in the second the wind proved favorable, and four points were bootied by "Doc" Campbell. Towards the end of the quarter a touch was made, but was not converted. In the second half, the Science team showed more opposition but on a fumble, an earned touch was made, and a long run by Smith gave the winners a chance to go over for another try which also was not converted. A point in the last quarter completed the scoring.

Capt. Henri de Man, M.C., delivered the first series of lectures, to be given at the university this session by a number of representative men, in Convocation hall Tuesday afternoon. Capt. de Man, who addressed audiences at the university last year and who has been serving industrial conditions in Belgium preparatory to returning to Belgium, spoke on "The Psychology of Workmanship."

The speaker directed his remarks to the discontent and unrest that exists among the workmen of the day. To a great extent this is due to the fact the same interest in the product is not aroused by the workmen in these days of machinery as was aroused in the earlier years when most of the work was done by hand.
